

Girls League Members Attend State Meeting

Crater High School was represented at the Girls League State meeting at Pendleton by Charlene Croucher, Harriett Morris, Lois Vanderpool, Donna Anderson, and Doreen Bohnert on May 3, 1952. Miss Aasen, Girls League Advisor, accompanied the girls to Pendleton.

The girls left early Friday morning and stopped at several points of interest, arriving in Pendleton at about 7 p.m. Registration was held at Vert Hall which is part of the Junior High. A point of attraction at the school was its Indian museum. The girls were registered and sent to private homes where they stayed.

A general assembly was held Saturday morning. About 200 girls attended. At the meeting, presided over by last year's president, general business was taken care of and a new constitution passed.

The main speaker was Mrs. Van Loan from Oregon State College. Her subject was "Today Is Yours." She spoke about the importance of doing things today because tomorrow never comes and yesterday was wasted. She said 90% of our time was spent dreading what we had to do, during time that should be spent doing. It was a timely and worthwhile talk.

Candidates for offices gave their nomination speeches during the meeting. One of the candidates was Lois Vanderpool, who was running for president.

After the assembly, the girls divided into smaller discussion groups on money making, behavior, responsibilities and duties for president, and a group for the advisors.

At noon a luncheon and program was put on by the Pendleton Girls League. The officers and scrapbook awards were also presented. Dr. Millar, a former teacher and traveler was the after-dinner speaker. After the officers were installed and presented with corsages, a party was held in their honor. The scrapbooks were displayed at the party and there was a short program. The rest of the afternoon was left free.

After an early start Sunday morning, the girls traveled to Painted Hills State Park. Just as its name implies, it does have beautiful hills of bright colors. The group arrived home at about 10:30 P.M.

The girls found the hospitality wonderful and they enjoyed their trip and brought back lots of ideas. They recommend sending delegates next year. The convention will probably be at Prineville next year because Ann Stearns of Prineville was elected President. The vice-president was from North Bend, the secretary was from Baker, and the treasurer was from Lincoln High of Portland.

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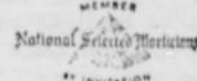
