

Notice to Voters

Thousands of ballots cast in tomorrow's Oregon primary election could be disqualified because of common voter-errors, if the experience in previous state elections is any criterion.

This cautionary word came today from the state headquarters of Register and Vote, Inc. of Oregon, in Portland.

Listed as the "most frequent" errors were erasure; drawing lines through, or underlining, candidates' names; voting for more candidates than are indicated, and writing in names without placing an X before them.

The announcement of Register and Vote, Inc. suggested that, instead of erasing, the voter invalidate his X by circling it; or he or she may ask for a new ballot.

Voters may vote for fewer cand-

(1) Adolph Zuckerman of New York City is regarded by his competitors as the leading designer, according to an article in the April "Catholic Digest." Since 1919 he has been chief designer of the Hoe Printing Press company. Write-in candidates are legally counted if the names of the candidate is placed in the proper space and preceded by an X.

Eisenhower is strongest along and near the Atlantic seaboard—as his extremely impressive victory in Massachusetts demonstrated. Taft, on the other hand, pulls his greatest weight in the mid-west and parts of the south. The Eisenhower camp was particularly elated by the fact that he attracted many Democratic voters in the Bay State primary. This, they argue, should be the clincher, on the grounds that no GOP candidate can win the presidency without cutting deep into the ranks of the Democrats and independent voters.

In any event, nothing has been decided. It is perfectly possible, for example, though not probable, that by convention time either Taft or Eisenhower could have enough delegates (603) to get the nomination on the first ballot. It is also perfectly possible that they would be so nearly equal in strength as to make the nomination of either impossible, and so force the choice of someone else. This last possibility, however, now seems very unlikely.

One other candidate will have a sizable bloc of delegates when the convention convenes. That candidate is Governor Warren, with his 70 California and six Wisconsin

votes. These votes represent powerful trading material. Governor Warren is making an aggressive effort to capture Oregon's 18 delegates in the May 16 primary. The forecast is that he will get a substantial popular vote, but that Eisenhower will get the delegates.

There is one fact to this race that has some cool heads worried. Bitterness is beginning to appear among both Taft and Eisenhower supporters. There is a tendency to get down into the political mud and start slinging it. The cool heads believe that the respective campaigns for the nomination should be conducted on a high political level, as political levels go. First of all, they say, both General and Senator are obviously men of the highest character, sincerity and patriotism. You can disagree with their views, but you can hardly call them cheap run-of-the-mill politicians. Secondly, the argument runs, the highest possible degree of unity among anti-Administration forces will be needed if a GOP victory is to be won in November, and this unity could be seriously undermined by mud-slinging between the Taft and Eisenhower backers. As for the two men personally, it cer-

tainly isn't to be expected that they will go in for dirty fighting.

The Democrats are in a pickle. The professionals within the party don't want Senator Kefauver, but he was swamped the field in the primaries. They like Governor Stevenson, an able man with a fine record, but he has shown no inclination to seek the nomination and he is not well known nationally. Administration men were strong for Senator Kerr, but he has shown no ability to obtain widespread popular support.

In the name of the Eisenhower-for-President committee, Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., chairman, issued the following statement, Saturday, May 10:
