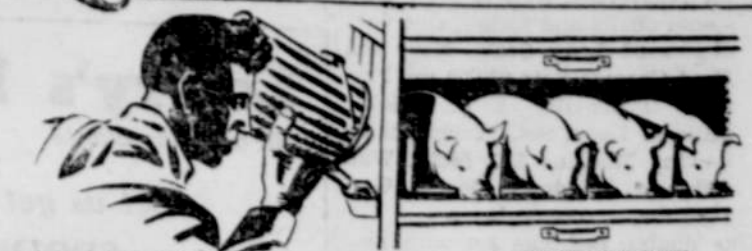

More Pork Chops for Everybody

More little pigs will go to market, from now on, because they'll drink Terralac—a new, synthetic sow's milk that makes them grow up faster. Terralac has already been tested successfully on more than 3,500 pigs with phenomenal results in cutting costs, increasing stock, and reducing mortality to 5 percent. On a national scale, this could mean an increase of several billion pounds of pork a year for the American Consumer.
