

Nearly 40,000 Bonus Checks Mailed to Vets

With the initial mailing of Oregon Veterans' bonus checks this week, the accounting division of the Secretary of State's office is still processing the checks at a rate of about 2,000 per day. Harold F. Phillippe, manager of the Accounting Division, said this week that this rate will be continued until the current backlog of applicants has been caught up.

The number of applications processed by the Bonus Division of the Veterans Affairs Department totaled 75,000 at the time arrangements were completed for sale of State Bonds to cover payment of the Bonus. A little more than 40,000 Bonus checks had been prepared by June 18 of this week when mailing began, according to Phillippe.

Getting out the checks is no little job, Phillippe points out, with all checks having to go through several processes. At present there are five persons of the Accounting Division working full time to prepare the checks for distribution. The Bonus Division of the Veterans Affairs Department sends a certified list, or voucher, of the Veterans and the amounts which they will receive. From these lists the sheets of checks are written by girls working a big electric check writing machine.

Next the checks are dated and separated from the sheets. Other workers feed the rectangular slips of paper into protectograph machines which write the amount shown on the checks in a corrugated pattern, this to prevent the amount of the check being raised or made into a higher amount than intended. At all stages the number of the check and its amount is recorded, the protectograph totaling these amounts for balancing. Final process is running the checks through the signing machine which affixes Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry's name on the dotted line, as the disbursing officer.

The checks are mailed by the Bonus Division, using envelope stuffing machines and mailing machines of other state departments, according to W. F. Gaarenstroom, Veterans' Affairs Director.

Following the initial rush to prepare the checks, the Secretary of State's Accounting Division will probably process 500 to 1,000 bonus checks daily, Phillippe indicates. This will be in addition to the regular work of the division which includes making out the state payroll, auditing all state expenditures and the operating of the state institutions.

More than 90,000 Veteran's applications are now on file with the Bonus division. The first payments made on the 75,000 applications now processed, will be completed by the end of July, according to Bonus Division officials.

Economic Highlights—

The Supreme Court of the United States has known many historic moments. These were when decisions were handed down whose ultimate importance dwarfed the particular litigation involved, and established precedents touching on the tremendous, fundamental question of what powers government or a branch of government have—and what powers they do not have. It knew such a moment on June 2, when Justice Black delivered the majority opinion in the steel seizure case.

Far more than the interests of the steel owners or the steel workers were involved here. The question was whether a President, lacking any specific authority in the Constitution or an Act of Congress, could, if he felt it necessary to the public interest, seize private property entirely on his own responsibility. The government lawyers said that he could. The lawyers for the steel industry said he could not. In the district court, Judge Pine held against the President on every count. Only the court of last resort could make the final decision.

Justice Black began with a factual summary of the case and the arguments that had been presented. He then said, "Two crucial issues have developed: First, should final determination of the constitutional validity of the President's order be made in this case which has proceeded no further than the preliminary injunction stage; second, if so, is the seizure order within the constitutional power of the President?"

The answer to the first question was Yes—to the second, No.

Reading on, Justice Black said, "The President's power to issue the order must stem either from an Act of Congress or from the Constitution itself. There is no statute that expressly authorizes the President to take possession of property as he did here. Nor is there any Act of Congress to which our attention has been directed from which such a power can fairly be implied. . . . Moreover, the use of the seizure technique to solve labor disputes in order to prevent work stoppages was not only unauthorized by any congressional enactment; prior to this controversy, Congress had refused to adopt that method of settling labor disputes."

By this time, all listeners must have known that the President had

lost his case. Justice Black made it clear that Congress has the power to authorize the taking of private property for public use, if it chooses to exercise it. Then came these fateful, final words: "The founders of this nation entrusted the law-making powers to the Congress alone in both good times and bad. It would do no good to recall the historical events, the fears of power and the hopes for freedom that lay behind their choice. Such a review would but confirm our holding that this seizure order cannot stand."

"The judgment of the district court is affirmed."

So ended one of the most important cases of modern times—and so was established a precedent of the most far-reaching significance. To the layman, it would seem that the majority for whom Justice Black spoke reaffirmed the ancient principle that this is a government of laws, not of men.

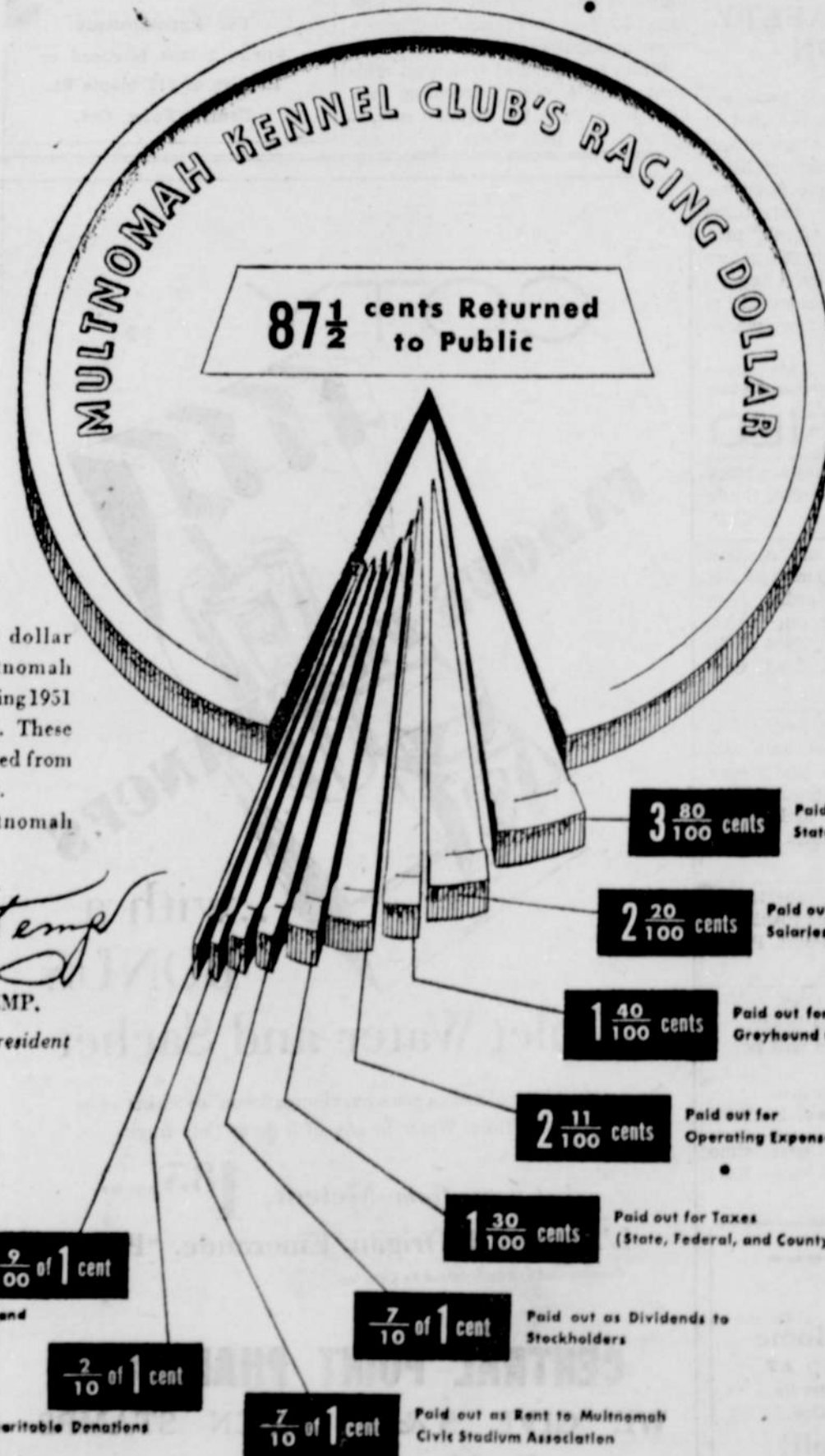
