TRAFFIC SAFETY DIVISION

Death is riding Oregon highways this month, as accidents reported to the Secretary of State's office reflect sharp increases in traffic fatalities.

In seven days 10 people lost their lives in traffic, seven in only three accidents and three in "freak" mishaps, the department's traffic safety division reported Friday. Reports now in the mail are expected to bring the toll for the first two weeks to at least 15.

One of his favorite dishes is this Mexican Meat Pie, which the real-life Wild Bill Hickok might have been seen eating in a Mexican border town one century ago. Here's the recipe from Guy himself:

MEXICAN MEAT PIE

3 tablespoons shortening
2 cups chopped onion
1 pound ham (cut in 1/2 inch cubes)
1 pound veal (cut in 1/2 inch cubes)
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups tomatoes
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1/2 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
2 whole cloves
1/2 teaspoon mace
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 cups oven-popped rice cereal

Melt shortening, add onion and meat. Cook until lightly browned. Add flour and mix well. Add remaining ingredients except rice cereal and turn into a large baking dish. Top with cereal and bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 35 minutes.

Four people were killed in Clatsop county on June 6, when the driver lost control of the car after attempting a left turn and it plunged through a guard rail into a river.

Two died in a Jackson county mishap when a truck trailer skidded to the left, and struck their car. A dramatic account of this accident was provided by a witness who could see what was going to happen, he said, about 25 yards before the collision.

He stopped, and ran back across the highway to the truck, and found the truck driver beside the wrecked car. "I asked if there was anyone who needed assistance," the witness later told police.

"I think they're dead," the driver replied.

"I also felt they were beyond help," the witness concluded.

Another freak accident killed one man when a gas tank fell from a truck on to a Josephine county highway and exploded under his car.

"How fast is too fast," is a question bothering many Oregon drivers, concludes the Secretary of State's traffic safety division after a look at June accident reports received to date.

The division said most the serious mishaps in the first half of June took place on roadways outside the limits of cities and towns, and that speed too fast for "conditions" was a main accident causing factor.

While the speed at which an accident vehicle was proceeding may have been legal, the division said, it became too fast when the driver

was unable to avoid a collision as a sudden emergency situation developed.

Even normal highway cruising speeds become dangerously fast when other traffic is making turning movements on and off the highway, safety officials pointed out. Other cues for slowing down are conditions such as slippery or rough road surfaces, congestion, curves and reductions in visibility because of rain, dust or smoke.

One effect of speed is made clear by Oregon records, the division said. Persons injured in a traffic accident at 60 miles an hour are eight times more likely to die of their injuries than persons injured at 20 miles an hour or less.
