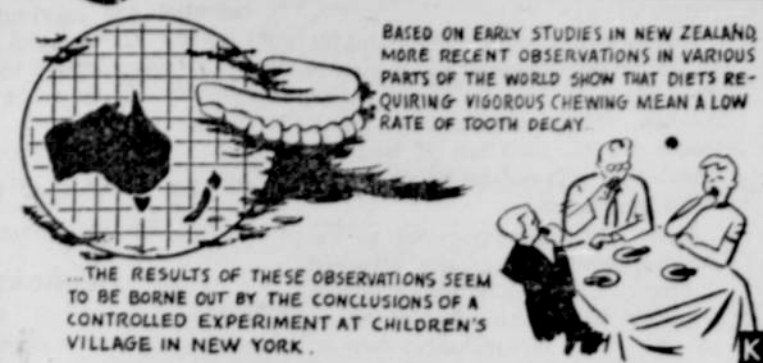

More Chewing—Less Tooth Decay

Teen-agers who give their teeth added "exercise" by chewing on hard, fibrous foods are only half as likely to develop new cavities as those eating diets in which these substances are lacking.

These conclusions are drawn from an 18-month study of 266 boys at Children's Village, Dobbs Ferry, N. Y. Collaborating in the work were Dr. H. H. Neuman and Dr. N. A. DiSalvo, both of Columbia University and Dr. Wm. Lefkowitz, of the Dental Department of Montefiore Hospital, New York.

The experiment was prompted by Dr. Neuman's observations in widely-separated parts of the world that diets requiring vigorous chewing are often associated with a low rate of tooth decay. In the study, 102 boys daily re-

ceived 6-inch sections of sugar cane, a tough fibrous plant, which they chewed under supervision. The other 164 were divided into two control groups. One drank sugar cane juice in amounts equivalent to that contained in a section of the cane. The second got neither cane nor juice.

The results showed that the first group—"the chewers"—had only half the increase in decayed, missing and filled teeth as either of the other two. As a consequence of their tests, the research directors have adopted a working theory that lack of resistance to tooth decay may be the result of structural changes in the teeth which, in turn, result from too little hard mechanical exercise.

"Timberwolf" Squad Now at Fort Lewis

Fort Lewis, Washington—July 21. (Special)—More than fifteen hundred Oregon and Washington army reservists of the famed 104th "Timberwolf" division have taken over the northeast Fort Lewis area for their annual two-week summer training period, July 20 through August 3.

Brigadier General Lamar Tooze of Portland, commanding general of the "Timberwolves," arrived here at noon Sunday aboard the troop train carrying Oregon and southwest Washington personnel. On hand to meet the Northwest's new general was Col. W. D. Hamilton, assistant division commander, from Tacoma.

General Tooze, first Oregon reserve officer to wear the silver star of a brigadier general, was presented his new insignia of rank at an early Sunday morning ceremony before the troop train left Vancouver Barracks enroute to Fort Lewis. The presentation was made by Col. John H. Rodman, commander of the

Oregon military district and a survivor of the Bataan death march of 1942.

Veteran of two world wars and 35 years of army reserve work, General Tooze has commanded the Oregon-Washington "Timberwolf" division since 1946. In World War I he served with the 91st Div. During the last war General Tooze, a Portland attorney, was inspector general of the 78th division, then assistant inspector general of the 3d Army and later held the same post with the 1st Army. Six months after he landed on Omaha beach in France, December 1944, he was promoted to full colonel. He returned to his Portland law practice after separation from the service in September, 1945.

The unprecedented turnout of "Timberwolf" reservists will make it possible for this encampment to be the most successful summer training program undertaken by civilian soldiers in the Northwest since the end of World War II, according to General Tooze.

Emphasis will be placed on individual and unit training throughout the 1952 summer camp schedule.
