Winners of Babe Ruth Awards



WASHINGTON, D. C.—Following the belief that good sportsmanship is essential to the American way of life, a committee composed of 42 of the nation's leading sports writers has chosen two outstanding high school graduates, Jacqueline Major (left) of Floyd, Va., and Ralph Thomas (right) of Sistersville, West Va., to represent the 6,000 nation-wide winners of the Babe Ruth Sportsmanship awards.

Miss Major, who lives with her grandmother and two brothers and a sister, has a perfect 11-year school attendance record, despite the fact that she had to walk two miles to the school bus stop and wade a river in the worst kind of weather. Her numerous household "chores" include milking a cow and chopping firewood.

Ralph Thomas' award is especially significant because of his unusual handicap. He has no legs. Mr. D. F. Arnett, his high school principal, declared, "You have to be a good sport with a handicap like that. Ralph is quite an inspiration. . . . In his spare time he coaches a basketball team."

Among the committee which selected these two are the presidents of both the Football and the Baseball Writers Associations, representatives of major news syndicates and papers across the nation.

Three thousand high schools in the U.S. cooperate in the program which is directed by the Babe Ruth Sportsmanship Awards Committee, composed of two representatives each from the National Association of Secondary-School Principals and the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation—both departments of the National Education Association—and from the Babe Ruth Foundation.

Pre-School Test For Under Age of Six To Be Given Soon

Parents of first grade children should note that a child must be six years of age on or before Nov. 15, 1952 before he will be admitted to the first grade without examination. A child who will be six years old between Nov. 15th and January 15th may be admitted if he passes the school readiness test showing mental and physical maturity to do regular first grade work.

The pre-school test for these under age pupils will be given Monday, August 18th in Mrs. Laird's room in the brick building at the Central Point School. Parents may call the school superintendent's office, telephone number 1542, and make an appointment for the test which requires about one hour of time.

Every child should have a physical examination before entering the first grade. An infant and pre-school Clinic will be held at the Central Point Elementary School on Monday, August 18th, beginning at 1:15 P.M. Appointment should be made by calling Mrs. John Clark at telephone number 642.

Examination for Postmaster To Be Held

An open competitive examination to fill the vacancy in the position of postmaster in this city has been announced by the United States Civil Service Commission at the request of the Postmaster General.

In order to be eligible for the examination, an applicant must be a citizen of, or owe allegiance to, the United States; must have actually resided within the delivery of the post office for which the examination is held, or within the city or town where such office is situated, for at least 1 year immediately preceding the date fixed for the close of receipt of applications; must be in good physical condition; and must be within the prescribed age limits. The competition is open to both men and women.

Under the terms of an Act of Congress, approved June 25, 1938, the Civil Service Commission will certify the names of the highest three qualified eligibles to the Postmaster General who shall thereupon submit the name of the one selected to the President for nomination. Confirmation by the Senate is the final action.

Applicants will be required to assemble in an examination room for written tests, and will also be rated on their education, business or professional experience, general qualifications and suitability. The Civil Service Commission will make an impartial inquiry among representative patrons of the office, both men and women, concerning the experience, ability, and character of each applicant, and the evidence thus secured will be considered in determining the ratings to be assigned to the applicants. The Commission is not interested in the political, religious, or fraternal affiliations of any applicant.

Full information and application forms may be obtained at the post office in this city, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C. Applications must be on file in the office of the Commission at Washington 25, D.C., not later than the closing date specified at the head of the examination announcement.
