Unemployment Runs Higher Than Last Year

Unemployment in Oregon is running from 15 to 30 per cent higher than a year ago and no serious shortage of harvest workers is expected for at least another week or two, according to reports from local offices of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

Claims for compensation filed since the beginning of the 1952-3 benefit year July 1 have reached 14,787 as compared with 12,603 a year ago, while payments to insured workers last month totalled \$469,156, an increase of 31 per cent over the same period of 1951.

Only one area, McMinnville, now has an actual shortage of harvest help, although Salem, Eugene and other valley offices anticipate heavy demands by Mid-August. Labor surpluses were reported from practically all districts despite considerable bean picking during the past week.

With both shelters and trailer space available at the Dayton farm labor camp, McMinnville now can use about 50 more families in Yamhill county. Housing is fairly well taken in most areas, but many farms have cabins and other facilities for groups.

Hops, pears, and other late crops will add to the demand for harvest help during the latter half of August, according to reports. Picking of canberries and other early crops has been completed in most districts.

OSC Students Advised to Make Housing Plans

Oregon State College—College opening is still a calendar page away, but Oregon State College students were advised this week to be thinking about housing arrangements.

On the campus, adequate dormitory space is assured for all single men and women wishing to live in

the residence halls, according to Robert C. Koehler, director of dormitories. Campus housing for married couples is all taken, but prospects for off-campus housing in private homes and apartment houses are "excellent."

Some single rooms are still available for both men and women in the dorms. Broad fees remain exactly the same as last year—\$47 per month in all halls—and room rentals are the same with one exception. In Central hall for men, the room rent has been increased from \$45 to \$50 per term. Rent per term in the main dorm for men and Waldo hall for women is \$53; in Sackett hall for women, \$68 per term.

Help with campus housing arrangements is available to students from the director of dormitories, administration building. Off-campus listings are available from the housing-employment office, commerce building.
