

WM. HENSLEY, POLIO VICTIM, DIES TUES. IN EUGENE HOSPITAL

William Hensley, 316 First street, died in the Sacred Heart hospital in Eugene Tuesday morning, August 19. He was taken there Sunday by plane for treatment of poliomyelitis.

Mrs. Hensley is now in the Eugene hospital under treatment for polio, which struck her last week. She too was flown north for treatment, and she was said to be making good progress.

The couple were parents of four children, ranging in age from two months to seven years. While Mrs. Hensley is in the hospital, two of the children will be cared for by Mrs. Hensley's mother, in Couer D'Alene, Idaho, and the other two will be taken by his mother, in Glendale, California.

He also is survived by a sister in Salem, Oregon.

The Hensley's had lived in the Rogue valley for about the past five years. He was about 35 years of age, and was a radio technician for the Civil Aeronautics administration here. He was a veteran of World War II.

Funeral services will be conducted on Friday at the Hillcrest funeral home in Grants Pass, at time yet to be set, it was reported today.

Parents Reminded of Benefit Plan for School Children

C. A. Meyer, principal of Central Point elementary school, is anxious that all parents of school children be reminded of the Student Mutual Benefit Plan, operated by the Oregon School Activities Association for the cost of \$1.25 per student for the year. (In the past, many parents, following an injury to their child at school, have stated they knew nothing of the plan and have regretted not having their children covered by it.)

The first week of the plan, will be sent home by each student; parents are requested to sign the slip and return it, whether they wish it or do not want the student covered.

Any student enrolled in school, for the fee of \$1.25 is covered against accidental bodily injury from the time they leave home in the morning until they return after school, whether in classroom, in bus or on bicycle, provided it is the regular route to school.

A plan for such a low cost must have some limitations, such as skin infections or injuries resulting from fighting or scuffling, etc. This plan is to give each student coverage up to \$300 total for hospital, x-rays and doctor bills, on accidental bodily injuries during regular school time.

C.P. GRADE SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPT. 8 WITH FULL SCHEDULE

On Monday, September 8, school will begin with a full schedule of classes, beginning at 8:40 a.m., tardy bell will ring at 8:45 a.m. Dismissal will begin at 2:45 p.m. for grades 1 and 2, and at 3:28 for the other grades.

Registrations will begin on the morning of September 4 and 5, Thursday and Friday, when all first grade students are asked to register. Others will register in their room on Monday. Late registrations will be in the office after Wednesday, September 10.

The staggered noon hour will be scheduled as follows: grades 1—11:15 a.m.; grade 2 at 11:20; grades 3 at 11:25 and on, allowing 5 minutes for each additional grade. Classes will resume at 12:30 for grades 1, 2 and 3; 12:45 p.m. for grades 4, 5 and 6 and at 12:50 for the 7th and 8th grades.

TO PARENTS—

Often parents of students are anxious to know what money and supplies are necessary for the beginning day of school. Since the first day, Sept. 8, will be a full day of classes, it is essential that students be equipped to begin work that day, if possible.

Workbook fees are 50c for grades 1 and 2 and 75c for all other grades. Student body fee is 75c for upper grades while the insurance (Student Mutual Benefit Plan) will be \$1.25. For the junior high students there will be a \$1 locker deposit (returnable at the end of the year).

First graders will use a box of crayolas and a pencil tablet; their teachers prefer them to use a large pencil which costs 5c at their room. Other grade students will need pencil, tablet and crayolas. Upper grade students use a notebook to keep papers and notes.
