Farm Youth Delegates Plan Winter Travels

Bolivia and Brazil will be the destinations of Oregon's two delegates in the winter International Farm Youth Exchange program, announces Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, state 4-H club agent at Oregon State college.

Jack Wells, 27, Independence, a 1951 graduate of OSC, will visit Bolivia, and Harry Tavenner, 23, Klamath Falls, an OSC senior, will go to Brazil.

They will receive a week's train-

ing in Washington, D.C., before leaving for the southern hemisphere in mid-October. Each is expected to spend four to six months abroad.

On arrival overseas, Wells and Tavenner will live on assigned farms and share in the daily work and social life of their host families. After returning home, they will report their experiences in talks throughout the state.

Bread Stales Quickly In Frig, Study Shows

Homemakers who keep bread in a cooler—or even in the refrigerator—in hopes of keeping it fresh longer will be discouraged to learn that they are only making it stale faster.

Miss Agnes Kolshorn, extension nutrition specialist at Oregon State college, says the American Institute of Baking recently completed a study on the causes of bread staling. They proved that as the storage temperature of bread is lowered, the staling rate increases. Bread becomes stale most quickly at temperatures near freezing.

This, however, does not refer to frozen bread which is frozen and stored at well below freezing temperatures, Miss Kolshorn points out. This will keep fresh for many months.

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White Nylon Washing Suggestions Listed By Clothing Expert

How to launder white nylon—to keep or to restore its whiteness—is a problem for many homemakers, judging from the number of queries on the subject that come to county home economics extension agents.

Miss Lucy Lane, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State college, reports that the U.S. department of agriculture has done some research on the problem and has these recommendations to offer.

Wash white nylon separately from colored clothes. Soak them before washing; wash them with soap in soft or softened water, or with a "built" (alkaline) synthetic detergent; and rinse them thoroughly.

To restore whiteness to nylon garments which have been worn and laundered many times, soak the clothes in three or four changes of water softened with sodium hexametaphosphate, a product that

sells at retail under brand name. This removes soil and hard-water "soap curds."

A chlorine bleach proved most effective for whitening grayed or discolored nylon, but has the disadvantage of weakening nylon fabric.

Sodium perborate, a milder bleach, ranks second for whitening and may be safer and easier to use. This can be bought at drug stores and also included in some packaged bleaching preparations. Two of these products were tested, one containing 44 percent and the other only 5 percent perborate. The latter was no more effective than washing in soft

water and soap. Bleuing in the final rinse water was the only method found to be effective in giving a white appearance to yellowed nylon garments. The bluing disguises the yellow tinge.
