Craters Down Myrtle Creek 29-7

The Crater Comets added their fourth win against no defeats Saturday, Oct. 11 as they pounded out a satisfactory win over Myrtle Creek 29-7, on the Myrtle Creek field.

The first Crater touchdown was the result of a drive from the Comet 35-yard line to the Viking end zone after Crater took the opening kickoff. Quarterback Don Wisely scored from the one-yard line and Jim Halfhill's try for point was no good. Bob King added two more touchdowns for Crater in the second quarter and one extra point while Gordon Carrigan countered the other extra mar. Halftime score stood at 20-0 in favor of Crater.

The Comet scored a safety on the opening kickoff of the second half as Ron Lapp recovered a Viking fumble behind the Myrtle Creek end zone. Crater also added a touchdown in the third period as Bob King again scored. Ron Lapp added the extra point to finish the Crater scoring.

Myrtle Creek gathered seven points to make the eventual outcome a 29-7 score in favor of the Crater High Comets.

Crater Wins 27-20 From IV Cougars

A fourth quarter touchdown Friday night, October 17, gave Crater High a 27 to 20 decision over an Illinois Valley club playing its best game of the season. The tussle was played at Cave Junction.

It was unbeaten Crater's third District No. 6 A-2 and set the stage for the tangle next Saturday that should decide the southern division champ. The Comets meet Ashland at Ashland.

Crater got off to a headstart again at the Cougars driving 68 yards for a touchdown after the opening kickoff. Del Tucker went the last three yards and Carrigan ran over the conversion. Illinois Valley rallied with a 30-yard pass play, Stan Campbell to Melvin Barton for a touchdown and Larry Maurer kicked the conversion for a 7 to 7 knot at the end of the first quarter.

Illinois Valley scored in the second period taking over the ball on a Crater fumble on the Comet 25 and moving to the goal on six plays. The conversion kick was blocked. The Cougars were on top 13 to 7 at half time.

Crater caught up in the third quarter on Bob King's 78-yard sprint. But an IV pass play was good for 77 yards and a touchdown and Maurer's conversion gave the Cougars a 20 to 13 lead. The Comets got going from their 35, however, and Carrigan carried the ball for the last five yards. Carrigan ran

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over the extra point and the count stood 20 to 20 at the end of the third quarter.

In the final stanza Crater drove 73 yards for a touchdown. Carrigan pushed over from the nine and then went over also for the extra point. The Comets got the ball on their own 30 and had driven to the Cougar one-inch line when the game ended.
