Ye Editor Says--

Next Tuesday you will be charged that most important thing in your life when you enter the voting room. Whatsoever you vote, you change the fate of the nation and of those candidates who are appealing for your votes. This year's campaign has gotten out of bound now and are a dirty, mud-slinging affairs. To see the President of United States Harry Truman using our hard-earned tax-money up on traveling all over the eastern coast giving hell to the Republican candidate stinks to high heaven. Stevens may be all right but it is time that we have a change in the White House.

That amendment, authorizing alcoholic liquor sale by individual glass, is the slickest piece of thing to put over the people and I am really opposed to that. And every one of you should mark 331 X NO on the ballot.

Be sure that you vote correctly on those two truck bills. They are so confusing. But the best way to do is to write 318 X YES and 331 X NO on a piece of paper and take it with you to mark on the official ballot.

But whatsoever you do not agree with me on any voting recommendations, there is one thing that is so big in the American way of life and that is by going to the voting precinct and VOTE The American way. The future of America is in your hands only.

County Polio Case Total Rises to 33

The 1952 polio toll rose to 33 today with the reporting of one new and two older cases, according to Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health doctor.

The last cases involved an 8-year-old girl who attends school in Phoenix. She has the paralytic type with one arm paralyzed. Symptoms were noticed one week ago.

The other two were under observation for the last month. They were a 9-year-old boy in Central Point who had the non-paralytic type and is back in school, and a 47-year-old Medford man who had a slight paralysis in his left shoulder with no other symptoms. The latter has kept at his job during the whole time, Merkel said.

Six of the 33 poliomyelitis cases occurred last week. Four were in Medford, and one each in Talent and Central Point.
