ANTELOPE 4-H FAIR—

Over four hundred people attended the Antelope fair, with most of the 4-H Clubs of the county being represented. About fifty head of livestock were on exhibit and were used by local and visiting club members for the various classes.

A distinguished visitor was Miss Mary Rapp from the National 4-H Club office at Chicago. Official judges were Fred and Warren Baysinger.

Glen Klein, whose appointment as one of Jackson County's 4-H Agents, is effective August 18, was given a preview of local 4-H activity when he served as official judge at the Applegate Valley 4-H Fair August 6th.

People seek recreation in a million ways. Where the need for recreation is greatest one finds, usually, facilities and opportunities correspondingly unavailable. Where people congregate together in huge numbers, recreation is usually fabricated in some form by the ingenuity of Man.

While necessary under the circumstances and wholesome in effect, it does not provide the spiritual anchors required to ride out the storms of the Soul. These are to be found only in the depths of the unspoiled wilds. A desire to be re-created, a search for these spiritual anchors, is the reason for the establishment of public parks and playgrounds.

What may be accurately described as Wild Land is almost a thing of the past; this area is one of the rare exceptions.

Visit any of our local city parks—Tou Velle and Casey State Parks—Roadside and stream bank picnic areas, however, and one readily discovers that improved recreation facilities are scarcely adequate for the home folks, much less the thousands of tourists and Recreationists who are due to come here in increasing numbers.

No medicine can match the recreating power found in the sylvan silence of still woods, along the banks of silver-coated streams and on the edge of star-mirroring lakes! Here the freshness and fragrance

of wild flowers, the delicate scent of spruce and pine wash the soot of industry and the grime of struggle from the tired brain of Man. And in the encircling arms of Morpheus he forgets the toil and drudgery of life!

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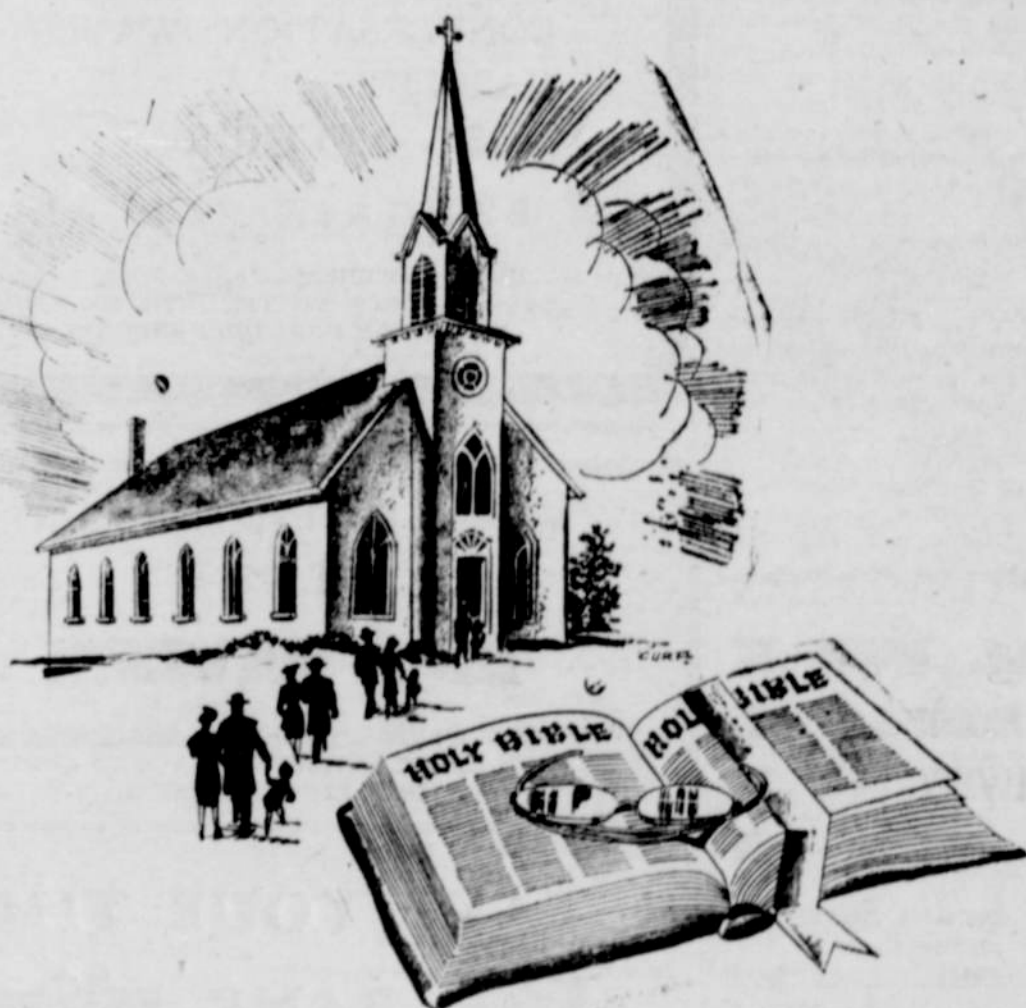
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
