You can well be proud of your three fine sons, Mrs. Wilson.

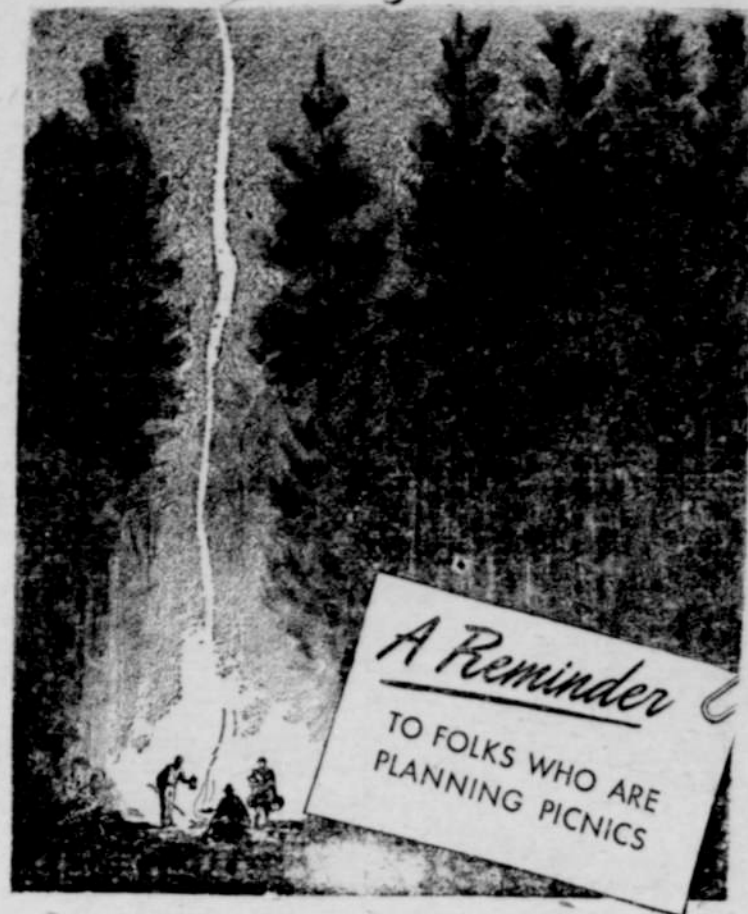
Ever get homesick for the sight of blue water?
