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Infectious Hepatitis Gets Discussion At JCPHA Meet

Several cases of infectious hepatitis have been reported here, over a period of time. There were several cases last winter. Sometimes the incubation period of this disease is 2 or 3 months.

A panel of four members of the county public office discussed the subject of infectious hepatitis at the bi-monthly meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association held Thursday, Jan. 21. The disease was used as an example of communicable disease control in Jackson county.

Speakers included Dr. A. E. Merkel, Miss Josephine Koppes, Walter Sutherland and Miss Mary Helen Swanson. Infectious hepatitis, or liver infection, as described by the panel is a relatively unknown disease, but has spread at an alarming rate throughout the United States. The statistics for Oregon are typical of the national picture, as are those for Jackson county. In 1952 there were 379 reported cases, while in 1953 the number had jumped to 1,219, in Oregon.

Superior Habits Needed

Personal contact, water, food and milk are the common forms of transmitting the disease. The symptoms may be marked or they may be practically unnoticed by the patient. In either case, the disease is thought to be contagious for a period of from one to two weeks, and the patient should be isolated during that time. Superior health habits, including proper diet, adequate rest and cleanliness are suggested as a precaution against contracting the disease.

M.O.D. Visitation Now At Conger-Morris

The March of Dimes will benefit from a visitation plan being inaugurated by Conger-Morris, it has been announced by managing partner Carlos W. Morris.

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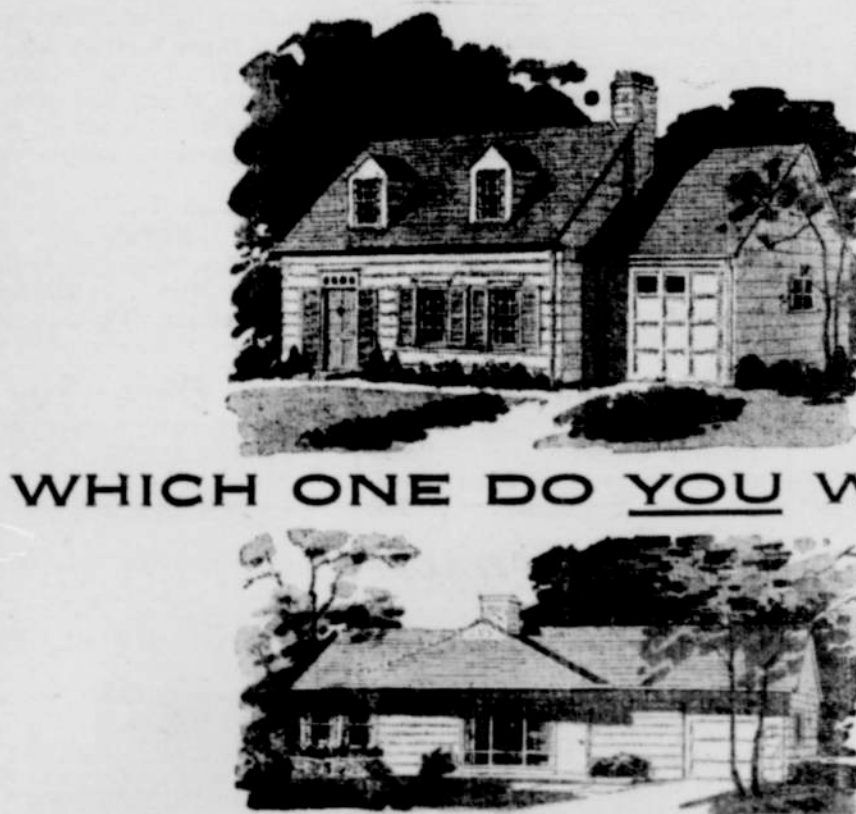
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
