Jackson County 4-H Council held its February meeting at the Central Point Grange hall.

The program was presented by Howard Saucy, from Dondee, an Oregon International Farm Youth Exchange who spent about five

months in France last summer and fall, living and working with French families. Howard showed pictures he had taken and told of his experiences. He noted a definite class system and a feeling that many Americans are poorly educated because they speak only their own language while educated Frenchmen speak several languages. Sanitary conditions are bad and there is very little modern equipment or machinery. This is partly because it is felt modern machinery, replacing hand labor, would increase unemployment. Very few tourists ever visit rural France.

The program was attended by parents and adult 4-H leaders, in addition to the junior leaders who form the membership of the 4-H Council. Following the program, short committee meetings were held and refreshments were sold. Proceeds were to be used for the IFYE program.
