Two Road Projects Near Central Point Scheduled for Bids

Bids on two Jackson county road projects near Central Point were received May 11 and 12 at the regular meeting of the Oregon State Highway Commission in Portland.

The new structures on county roads near town are: over Jackson creek on the Taylor road about three-fourths miles west of Central Point; and over Bear creek on the Upton road about one mile south of Central Point.

The bids were received on behalf of Jackson county and the structures are to be constructed at county expense.

At the highway commission meeting, the commission received bids on the largest number of projects every advertised by them at any one meeting. There were 45 highway, bridge, fencing, traffic signal installation and building projects estimated to cost \$5,000,000.

Grog Law Revealed By Liquor Group

Sale of beer, wine or distilled spirits for consumption on the premises is not legal during the hours the polls are open on election day, the Oregon liquor control commission reminded licensees this week.

However, sale of packaged beer and wine by authorized licensees for consumption off premises on election day is permitted by Oregon law. State retail liquor stores and the Portland and Salem office of the liquor commission will be closed May 21 in accordance with the Oregon liquor control act.

Strawberry Glaze Pie

3½ Cups strawberries (1 qt.)

¾ Cup sugar

2 T cornstarch

¼ t salt

1 cup water

Line baked shell with berries. Combine sugar, cornstarch, salt and water. Cook over low heat until thickened and clear. Pour glaze over the berries. Chill just before serving, garnish with whipped cream and whole berries. Note: fresh sliced peaches or whole raspberries may also be used.
