Seed Registration Deadline July 15

Growers of certified seed must register fields for inspection each year. The county agent's office in Medford will accept field registrations until July 15, according to Earl Jossy, county extension agent.

Field inspection is the first step in the certification program which ultimately results in the privilege of selling seed tagged by Oregon State College and certified to the variety and grade indicated on the tags.

Oregon's Seed Certification program is one of the most strict of all the states. This makes it more difficult to meet the requirements but also it places Oregon certified seed in a very favorable position for marketing. Most buyers prefer Oregon seed over all other states.

Earth Dam Complete On D. Smith Farm

An earth fill dam as part of an overall conservation program was recently completed on the farm of Delmar Smith, Scenic avenue, Central Point. Clem Ault, technician with the Rogue Soil Conservation district, revealed this week.

The dam is ten feet high and will store about six and one-half acre feet of water. It is planned to increase the dam's height by four feet, which would increase its capacity to 20 acre-feet.

Impounded water will be used for irrigation and fish production. Smith plans to "harvest" fish as part of his farm plan, either by direct sale of fish, or by sale of permits to fish.

Development of this pond and another small pond on the Smith



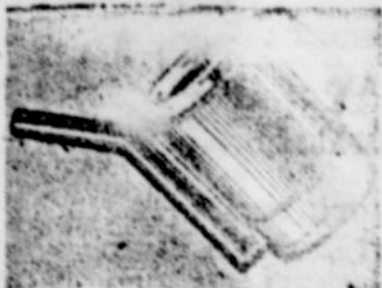
