Airman J. E. Chisum On Duty With NATS At Hawaiian Field

Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii (Special to the American)—James E. Chisum, airman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rollie L. Chisum of Central Point, has reported for duty with Navy Air Transport Squadron 7 (VR-7).

Before entering the navy in August, 1952, Chisum attended Crater high school where he was active in football and with Future Farmers of America. In the navy he has served aboard the aircraft carrier, USS Sicily, and at the Navy Air Station, Whitty Island, Wash. His brother, Robert, is in the air force, stationed at Larson Air Force Base, Moses Lake, Wash.

VR-7 is one of two navy squadrons flying with the Pacific division of the Military Air Transport Service, MATS, with which

VR-7 is affiliated, is an excellent example of armed forces unification.

Navy and air force planes and personnel during the Korean conflict supplied United Nations armies with more than 110 pounds of critical material and personnel every minute, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. VR-7, however, is self-sufficient, and can be moved as a unit to operate from any post which future world conditions dictate it be assigned to.
