Second Earwig Brood To Appear Shortly, Control Advised

A second brood of earwigs will be appearing shortly now which makes it an excellent time to take time to control measures. Earwigs are much more numerous in some years than others and this year is one of the bad years.

This variation in numbers is due to favorable climatic conditions and to the varying efficiency of predators. An earwig predator was introduced into the valley some years ago. In some years it keeps the earwig well under control but in other years the predators must die off as they

seem unable to keep the earwigs in check.

The first brood of earwigs appear in late April and the second brood in late July. When the earwigs are young they feed on grass and other low growing plants where they have a good deal of protection. In view of this DDT as a dust or spray should be used freely. As the earwigs will be found around the foundation, flower beds, fence rows and other places affording a hiding place, these are the areas that should be sprayed.

Black Aphis Trouble

Black aphid on beans are also causing more than normal trouble this year. These aphid as well as other forms of aphid can be controlled by spraying with Malathion. Use one tablespoon of Malathion in two gallons of water. Spray thoroughly being careful to spray to the undersides of the leaves.

Adjournment Date For Congressmen Reported in Doubt

Letter From Washington

The adjournment date of this session of Congress is still very much in doubt as this is written. Prior to the prolonged debate in the Senate on the bill known as the Atomic Energy bill, it was generally conceded that adjournment by July 31st was not only possible but likely. Now a fair guess would be August 7th.

A few years ago Congress passed what is called the Legislative Re-organization Act. It specifies that Congress shall adjourn on or before July 31st. There was an element of absurdity in that provision in the law for the simple reason that each two-year term of Congress is separate and independent.

The present Congress, for example, cannot make a law that would bind a future Congress. There is nothing except psychological value about the July 31st date. All that will be necessary to continue this Congress into the future after July 31 will be the passage of a simple resolution. This has been done several times since the so-called Re-

organization Act, which sets the adjournment date, was passed.

Atomic Energy Bill

In my opinion one of the most important bills—if not THE most important measure to be considered by Congress during my time as a member, is the pending bill regarding the peacetime or industrial use of atomic energy. It contains the set of rules under which this great new source of energy may be developed and used in our free economy—with private capital.

Additional Power

Unfortunately, practically all of the argument and debate about this bill so far has been on one minor section which has nothing at all to do with the purpose of the legislation. The row has developed over how the additional power needed by atomic energy plants in the South is to be obtained.

Those who think the Federal government should own and generate all electric power are demanding that the TVA be expanded to meet the power need. Others—obviously in the majority—believe the additional power can and should be contracted for from privately owned plants. That is what the present row is about but it has nothing at all to do with the future development of atomic power—which is the real and serious objective of the legislation.
