This way of eating allows you to eat a little bit of everything as long as you stay within your calorie limit, she stated. If you have good weight, you usually have good health, the agent said.

A total of 98 adults are currently enrolled in the two adult agriculture education courses being given at the Crater High school ag department.

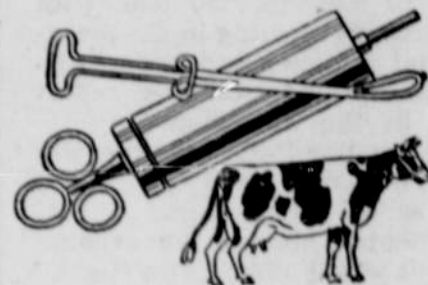
