Gold Hill Garden club met Friday, Jan. 21, at the home of Mrs. Arthur Boye on highway 99 N.

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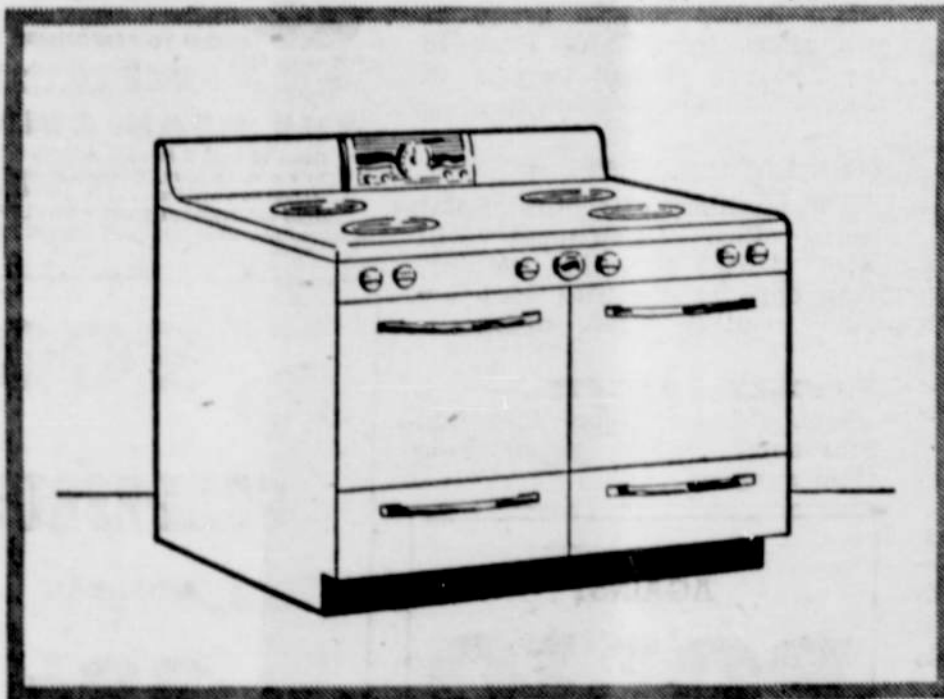
