

Annual Conclave Now In Progress At Local Church

Conference at the Community Bible Church is being held this week, Wednesday through Friday at 7:45 p.m. The speaker for Wednesday and Friday evening is Mrs. Anne Dievendorf of Japan. Mrs. Dievendorf went to Japan in 1922 and was among the Americans interned on the Islands during the harrowing years of World War II.

Coming out of internment she found her work wrecked, the churches burned and the congregations scattered. Rehabilitation immediately began, the mission was reorganized, all the burned churches were rebuilt and Bible school established in the atom-bomb devastated city of Hiroshima.

Among her ministries Mrs. Devendorf has taught Bible classes among the University students. She will show movie pictures, curios and costumes.

On Thursday evening Rev. R. M. Jackson, missionary to Viet Nam, Indo China, will speak and show pictures. Mr. Jackson has been on the mission field for 36 years and knows well the history of that land which is currently the hotbed of communist advance and strife. The Rev. Mr. Jackson was interned there during the war. After the war his residence was in Saigon, Hanoi province, but when the Reds captured DienBienPhu he was forced to move to Dalat and has continued his missionary work there since that time. Mr. Jackson is well-informed relative to the problems and conflicts that harass Southeast Asia.

The missionary services will be held three nights, Wednesday through Friday, the pastor, Rolf H. Hansen, states. The public is invited.

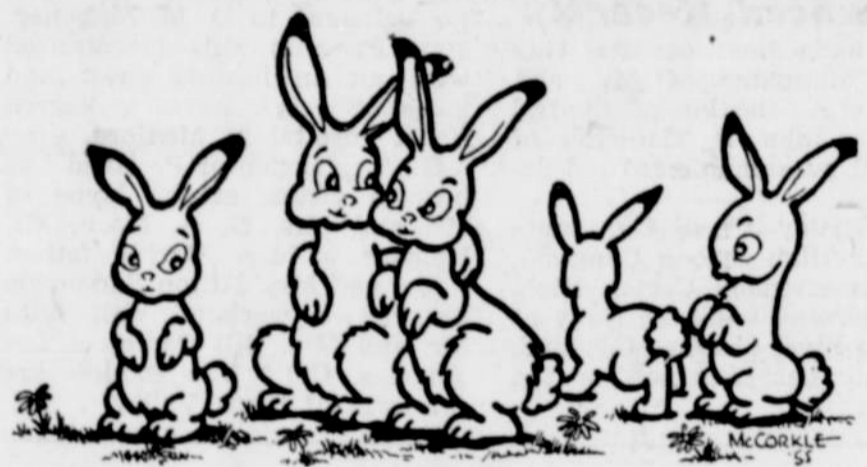

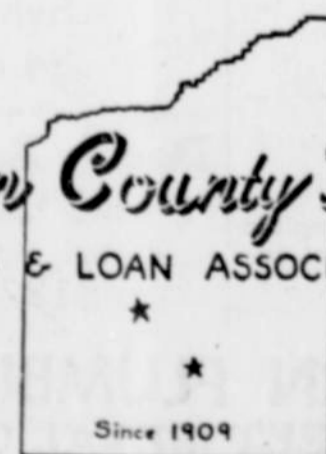
