A Stranger in Spain

by H. V. Morton

The discriminating reader has discovered that the best "magic carpet" journey to any land can be found under the label of H. V. Morton. Mr. Morton is a historian, an artist with words, and an astute reporter. He first poked into the nook and crannies and cobwebby corners of the British Isles and gave the world the "In Search Of" books. His journeys through Palestine and the Mediterranean regions resulted in the scholarly and inspirational pair, "In the Steps of The Master" and "In the Steps of St. Paul."

Once again Mr. Morton has taken his walking shoes and typewriter and made a country come alive in a veritable tapestry of local color, magnificent scenery and historical pageantry. Where else could one find real castles in Spain described like the fabric of one's dreams?

The author titled his book, "A Stranger in Spain," which is not strictly true. He would not be a stranger in any land. The reader rather suspects that Mr. Morton knows more about Spain than the natives themselves. Nor is he a stranger in experience—from the hotel clerks, inn-keepers, castle guides, nuns and priests of famous shrines, to the jolly miller that showed him the ancient methods of milling olive oil, the author found a warm response of friendship.

For a picture of the pomp of royalty, conquests of the Moors, thrills of the Conquistadors, the click of castanets, and the excitement of the bull ring, the reader is invited to be a fellow-stranger in Spain.

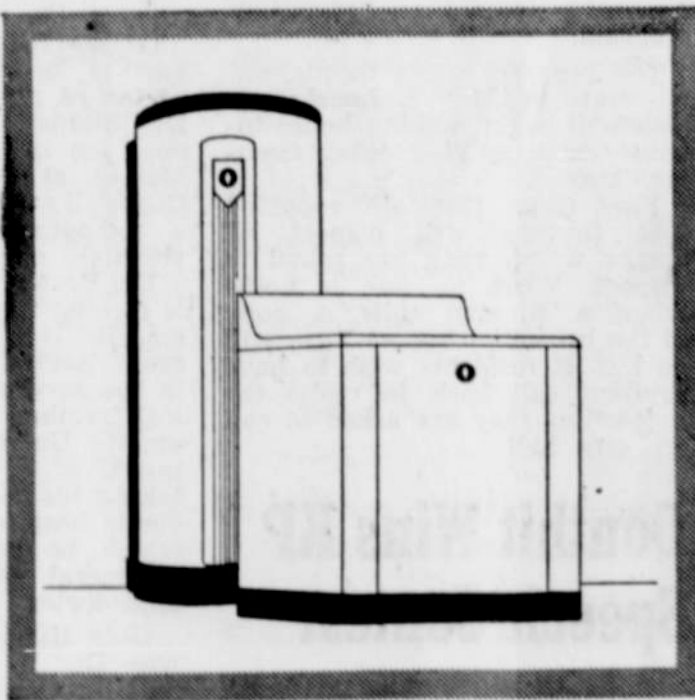
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
