Gang Saw Plant Building Starts In Gold Hill

GOLD HILL—Work began on April 25 in Gold Hill on the construction of the first unit of a plant to manufacture gang saws for the lumber industry.

The new industry will operate under the name of Jeddell Brothers Sweeney Mills. The plant is located on Southern Pacific property between Second Avenue and the railroad tracks. The structure to house the industry will be built on a concrete slab covering 5,760 square feet and will be of heavy timber construction covered with metal roof and siding.

Production of the saws will start in about two months. The Jeddell Brothers, Fred and Otto, are known in the valley having owned and operated a sawmill on Galls creek since 1946. They recently leased their sawmill to Stage Coach Lumber Co. The men were machinists in the mid west before coming to the Rogue valley. Their homes are in Grants Pass.
