Once again Dane Chandos writes of the Lake Chapala district of Mexico. In my opinion this is the most interesting of all the author's works—a colorful Mexican tapestry, in truth. The house of which he writes is converted into a small inn taking a few paying guests. Here Mr. Chandos unfolds his day-to-day adventures as "Senor of the Inn", an amateur hotelier who is at the mercy both of his loyal, unpredictable, and often maddening servants, and of his equally unpredictable and maddening guests. In addition to the charming native Indians and unusual boarders, the reader meets fishermen, farmers, general, painters, gypsies and pilgrims, all presented with the author's knack of capturing the Mexican spirit in both land and people. Each page brings its own rare portion of delight, for the mind and for the heart.
