A World of Love

by Elizabeth Bowen

This novel is a stirring change from the ambitious, vigorous plots of most modern and especially American authors, who may have jaded our appreciation for artistic writing. Miss Bowen must be enjoyed for her delicate and subtle style and her intelligent handling of the situations that unfold into revealing analyses of her characters.

As her theme, the author quoted Thomas Traherne's meditation: "There is in us a world of Love to somewhat, though we know not what in the world that should be . . ." Everyone must search and find something or some one to love. In each character in the novel, we see a different development of the theme: some loves are imaginary, some are lost, some are memories, some are overlooked and scarcely found, some are yet to come.

In a deceiving Irish country house, a packet of old love letters is discovered. The effect of these letters on each member of the household of Montefort is the heart of the story. In Jane we sense the illusive quality of the awakening of a young girl to an imaginary first love. Lilia is faced with the question of whether love can be recaptured and made enduring when once it has been tragically lost. Fred has fallen prey to a web of circumstances through which he plods wearily. For each of these can love be a miserable memory, a sparkling reality, or a rosy dream?

The publishers claim that this first novel in five years has captured Miss Bowen at the very summit of her powers.

Penny Taylor spent Saturday night with her grandmother Taylor in Gold Hill.

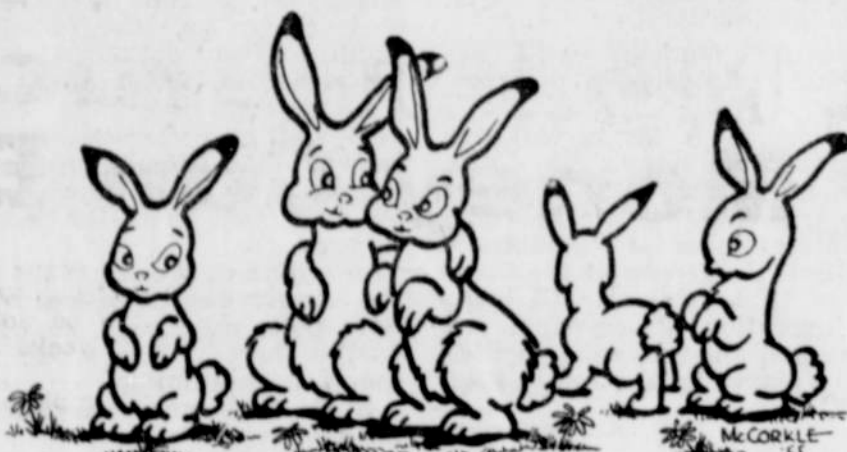

Miss Inlow was elected for a two year term. William E. Ruck, vice principal of Phoenix High school, was elected president of the association.

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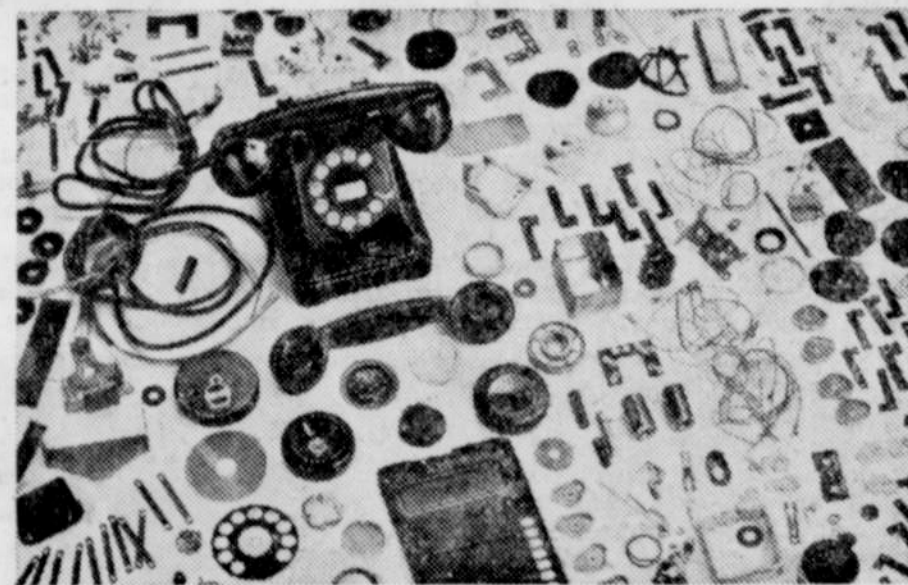
