Today we have chosen this column to be a reminder of one of the best ways to keep abreast of our current world, historically,

geographically and scientifically. Have you remembered lately the wealth of material available in the National Geographic Magazine?

Let us examine the contents of the June issue as an example. The main article is entitled "New England, a Modern Pilgrim's Pride". This is a description of the variety of attractions that greet the visitors to Yankee land. New England is a happy combination of American heritage, industrial enterprise and beautiful scenery—witness the pictures of covered bridges, rural villages, granite quarries, M.T.T. scientific experiments, autumn woods, rocky coastline and skiers' paradise.

The second article is "Glass Menageries of the Sea." As a result of the author's excursions along the North Atlantic coast, we have a collection of photographs and interesting information concerning jellyfish, sea anemones and other marine animals.

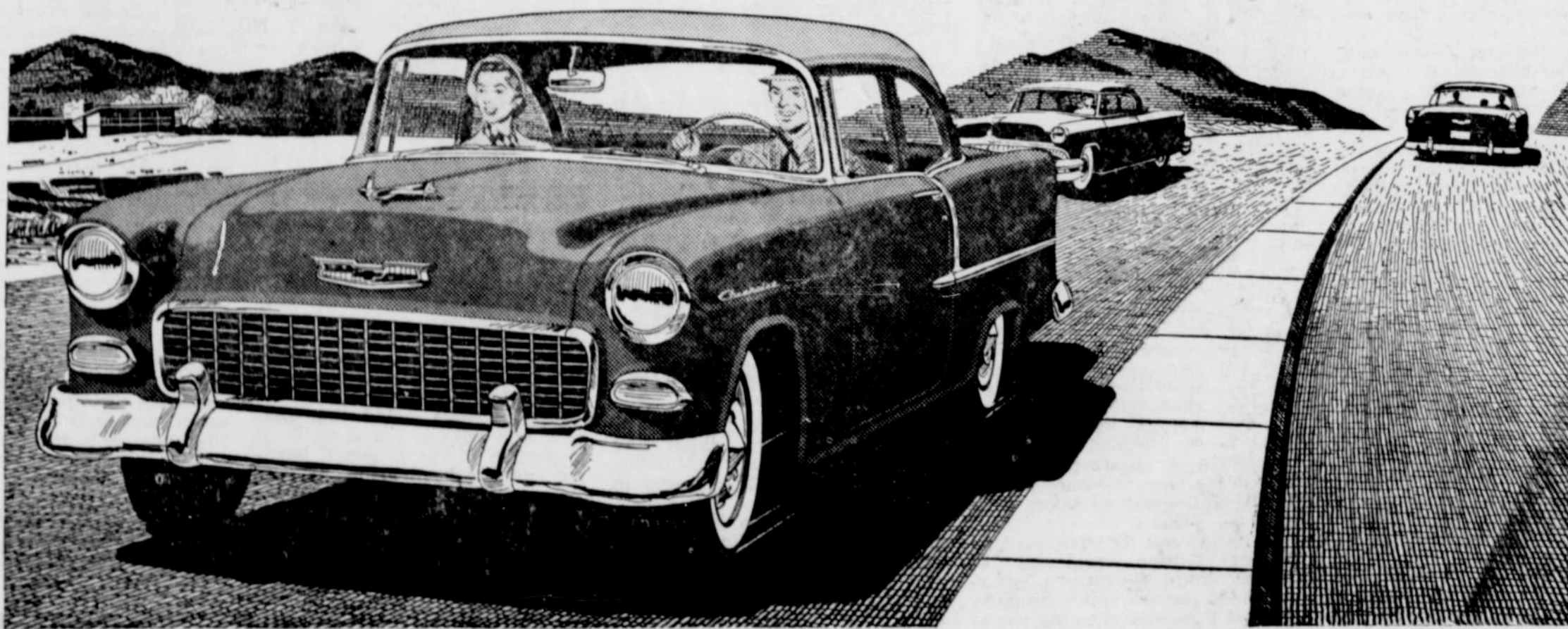
