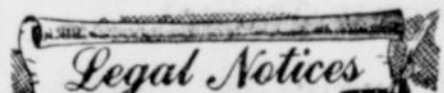

NOTICE OF SPECIAL
ELECTION OF THE
ROGUE RIVER VALLEY
IRRIGATION DISTRICT
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

1. That a special election will be held in the Rogue River Valley Irrigation District, Jackson County, Oregon, on Friday, the 15th day of July, 1955, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock in the morning and 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon at the office of the District, which special election shall be for the purpose of determining whether the Board of Directors of the District shall be authorized for and on behalf of the District to enter into a repayment contract with the United States of America, for the following general purposes: To provide for the repairing and rehabilitation and betterment by the United States of the District's irrigation facilities including, but not exclusive of, that portion of the District's irrigation facilities jointly owned with the Medford Irrigation District; to obligate the District to repay to the United States the cost of such construction, rehabilitation and betterment of said District's irrigation facilities in an amount not to exceed \$236,534.00 repayable without interest as follows: In 40 equal annual installments, the first of which installments shall be due and payable on December 31st in the year following the year in which the Secretary of Interior notifies the District that the work required to rehabilitate and better the District's irrigation facilities jointly owned with the Medford Irrigation District has been completed, and a like equal annual installment on each December 31st thereafter until the

total amount has been paid; to make the contract obligation a general obligation of the District; to provide for assumption of control of the District's irrigation facilities by the United States, if the District defaults, and for the inspection, care and protection of the District's irrigation facilities, and to contract with respect to those matters which are pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Reclamation Laws and of Acts amendatory or supplementary thereto.

2. That the maximum amount of money proposed to be payable to the United States by the District for construction purposes, as aforesaid, is the sum of \$236,534.00.

3. That for the purpose of said special election, the polling place has been established and located by the Board of Directors as follows: The regular office of the District located on the West side of the original Pacific Highway between the city of Central Point and the city of Medford in Section 12, Township 37 South, Range 2 West of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, Oregon, being the regularly used and established polling place of this District and situate within the district.

4. That the special election shall be by ballot; that the proposition to be voted on at the special election shall be as follows:

PROPOSITION: Shall the Board of Directors of the Rogue River Valley Irrigation District, Jackson County, Oregon, be authorized to negotiate and enter into a repayment contract with the United States of America, in conformity with the the proposal specified in the notice of this election, under the provisions of the Federal Reclamation Laws and of the laws of the State of Oregon authorizing the District to enter into such contracts.

The ballots to be used at such election shall put the fore-going proposition to the qualified electors by the following words and symbols:

Contract with the United States—Yes—(—)
Contract with the United States—No—(—)

5. That all persons qualified to vote at Irrigation District elections under the laws of the State of Oregon shall be entitled to vote at said special election and the election thereof shall be determined in all respects in conformity with the provisions of the laws of the State of Oregon.

6. That the polls shall be open at 8:00 o'clock in the morning on the 15th day of July, 1955, the day of said election, and shall be kept open until 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, when the same shall be closed.
