

Guernsey Cattle Breeders Tour Three Jays Farm at Gold Hill

GOLD HILL—A number of officials and breeders of Guernsey cattle stopped at the Three Jays Guernsey farm during their tour last Thursday, June 23. This farm is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. John Jaksch and son Johnnie. It is located on south Frontage road across the river from Gold Hill and has been operated as a dairy farm the past three years.

The guests arrived for the tour at 10 a.m. and included E. J. Meadows, of Portland, field representative of the American Guernsey Association; Harold Ewalt, dairy specialist from OSC, Corvallis; Earl Jossy, Jackson County, agriculture extension service; Keith Hockersmith of the grange co-op; R. The guests went through the compact milking parlor containing stanchions for twelve cows. In another section the cooler and also another room containing the pasteurizer, recently installed. A walk-in cold storage room is a part of the equipment.

The twenty acres are under irrigation and twenty-eight cows are in production at present.

The cows being pets to a certain extent seemed to enjoy the guests and the complimentary remarks about them.

Mrs. Jaksch showed a number of pictures taken before the land was leveled and the many rocks removed. The contrast with the present green productive fields and the attractive herd of red and white cows made an interesting "before and after" picture.

Irrigation comes from the Gold Hill ditch at the foot of Echo mountain.

After viewing the farm the guests gathered in the Jaksch yard for a picnic lunch. Mr. and Mrs. Jaksch furnished pint bottles of milk for all who wished and also supplemented the sack lunches with other food.

Irrigation Dam Bids Revealed

Bids for rehabilitation work on Fish Lake dam and on Four-Mile lake dam were opened Tuesday morning in Medford by representatives of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Also in attendance were Harold Sexton, manager-secretary of the Rogue River Valley Irrigation District, and Jack Hoffbahr, manager of the Medford Irrigation District, and representatives of the tow firms submitting bids.

R. K. Shelton of Roseburg submitted a bid of \$24,336 on schedule 1 and a bid of \$45,215 on schedule 2. E & W Construction Co. of Eugene submitted a bid of \$34,820 on schedule 1 and \$69,524 on schedule 2. Engineer's estimates on schedule 1 were \$27,963 and \$51,399 on schedule 2.

Schedule 1 concerns building a new spillway at Four-Mile lake dam, replacing a parapet wall and miscellaneous drain tile. Schedule 2 for Fish Lake dam has to do with work on the upstream face of the dam, excavation for a new spillway, drain tile and concrete work.

Bids have been forwarded to the regional director at the regional office of the Bureau of Reclamation at Boise, Idaho.

Final approval of the work will depend on the special elections slated for July 15 in both the Medford and Rogue River district. District residents will be asked to approve a contract with the United States for a long-term, interest free loan. Money from this contract will be used for major rehabilitation work in both irrigation districts.

Refreshments were served in the dining hall. Dancing followed with music provided by the Camp White orchestra.



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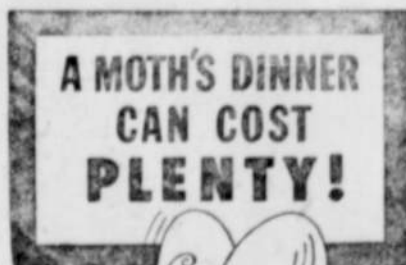
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
