Mekvold, Purdy, Smith Earn OreTech Honor Roll Listing

Festival Ticket Sales Run Ahead Of Last Year

ASHLAND—Ticket sales for the Oregon Shakespearean festival's coming season are running about 30 per cent ahead of sales on the same date last year, according to William Patton, festival general manager.

Patton said that sales are particularly heavy for weekend performances and for the first and last weeks of the season.

The season opens August 1 and runs throughout the month. A performance is given every night including Sunday, and the four regular plays are presented in rotation so that a visitor to Ashland may see all the plays by staying four days.

All of the outdoor theater's 1100 seats are reserved in advance. Patton said that good seats are still available for all performances.

As festival officials expected

the greatest demand for tickets has been for performances of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and "Macbeth," but reservations for "All's Well That Ends Well," the second comedy of the season, and "Henry VI, part 3" are also moving rapidly, according to Patton. Surprise of the season in the box office so far has been the heavy demand for tickets for the rarely produced "Timon of Athens," which will be seen in special performance on August 23 and 29.

Heaviest requests for tickets are coming from the Ashland-Medford, Eugene-Salem, and Portland areas, Patton said.

The box office at the theater in Ashland is open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily except Sunday. The Medford box office opens in the lobby of the First National Bank July 5, and will operate during banking hours.
