Marathon Hard-top Race Scheduled For Labor Day Weekend

Medford (Special)—Over 250 drivers from all over the west have been invited to participate in the first annual 24-hour marathon hard-top auto race, to be held here on Labor Day weekend, according to Bill Rozelle and J. D. Pierce, co-chairmen for the event.

A field of at least 150 top drivers are expected to start the race, sponsored by the Medford Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Qualifications for the grueling race will begin at the Sheriff's Posse ground track on Sage road in Medford Saturday, September 3. The race itself, with 40 qualifying drivers in contention, begins at 4 p.m. Sunday and runs to 4 p.m. Monday.

Purses of \$1,000 and \$500 for the first and second prizes and an additional \$1,000 for other place winners have been announced. Proceeds of the race will go to the Junior Chamber's fund for underprivileged children.

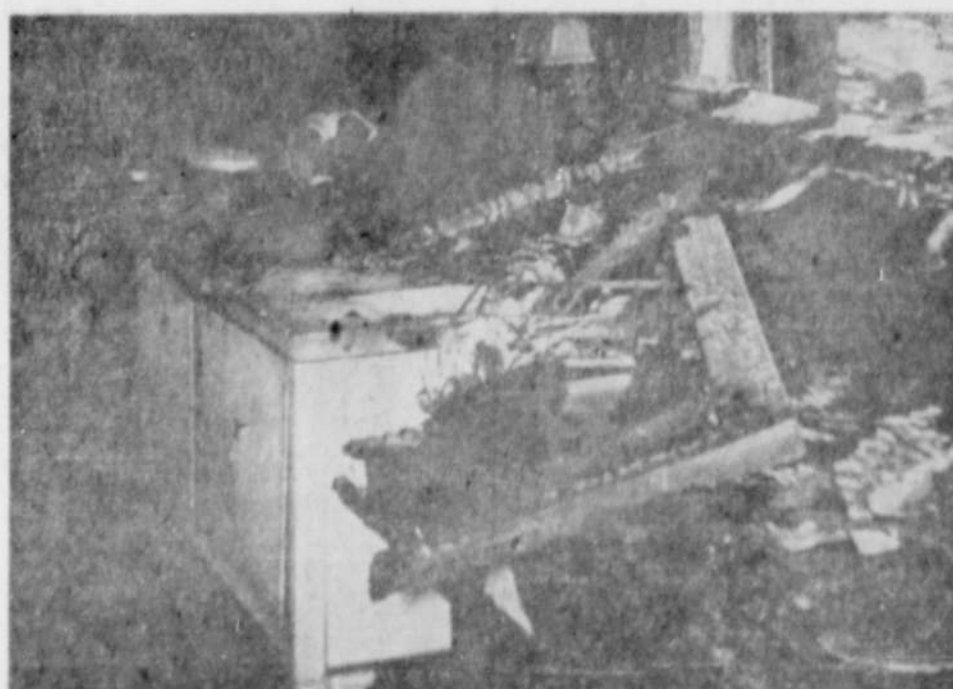
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
