Man's Life Span Up by 17 Years Statistics Show

The American male is living longer these days.

Whereas a baby boy born in 1900 had a life expectancy of 48.2 years, today's males can look forward to 65.5 years of life.

According to the Northwest office of the National Association of Manufacturers, recent government statistics indicate an increase of 30 per cent in the life expectancy of the American male, giving him 17 additional years for study, work and play.

A 1900 baby was expected to go to school for 13.7 years, work for 32.1 years, and enjoy retirement only 2.4 years, the NAM stated. Today, however, he will go to school 17.7 years, work 41.9 years and bask in retirement 5.9 years.

Although today's male works almost 10 years longer, he doesn't put in as many work hours in his lifetime as the 1900-born male. At the beginning of the century, the standard work week was 60 hours and vacations were rare. Now the work week has been reduced to 40 hours and paid vacations are the general rule.

Tremendous advances of medical science are responsible for allowing the American breadwinner 4 years more of schooling, 9.8 more working years and 3.5

years of additional retired life, the NAM said.

Retirement figures include both the conventional retirement at age 65 to which we are now accustomed, and involuntary retirement due to disability, which can occur at any age. In 1900 conventional retirement was almost unknown and practically all men worked until they died or were disabled, the NAM pointed out.
