

Highway Location Draws Protest From City Councilmen

A protest to the location of the proposed freeway east of Central Point and through land owned by School District 6 was made by city councilmen last Thursday evening.

A letter was ordered sent to the state highway commission and to the governor.

Members of the council pointed out that the planned highway would stop further development of the town in the north and east section and would cross the trunk sewer serving the city.

In other council business, Mayor Donald E. Faber asked members of the ordinance and finance committee to study a charter change in regard to the post of city recorder. Councilmen are investigating the possibility of making the position appointive rather than elective.

Wiring at the new fire hall-library building was discussed and councilmen noted that Romex cable had been used rather than conduit.

The council voted to take no responsibility for the error. Responsibility lies with the supervising architect. The wiring must comply with state code.

Harry Tonn, chairman of the parks committee, recommended to councilmen that the council accept the Sportsmen's club offer for the sale of land to the city on west Pine street.

The club asks for \$600, survey, warranty deed and title to .87 acres of the tract. The remainder of the property will revert to the city. A survey was authorized by councilmen.

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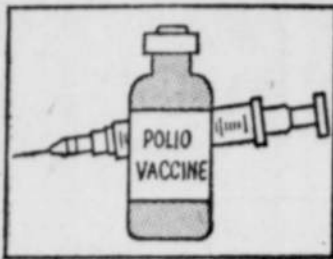
