Oregon State to Mark 88th Year of Classes

Oregon State College (Special)—Oregon State college, Oregon's oldest state educational institution, will mark its 88th year of classes September 26 when the 1955-56 year begins.

New freshmen and transfer students start their week of orientation, placement and examination and meetings with advisors September 18. Registration for both new and old students will be September 23 and the morning of September 24.

Enrollment is expected to top the 5600 figure estimated by college officials last spring. This will be considerably above last fall's registration of 5243 and is indicative of the sharp increases coming in year ahead.

The number of new students admitted to date is 18 percent above a year ago.

In Nampa, Idaho, they will be joined by Rev. Harley Briggs, a former schoolmate of Kreiders and assistant district superintendent.

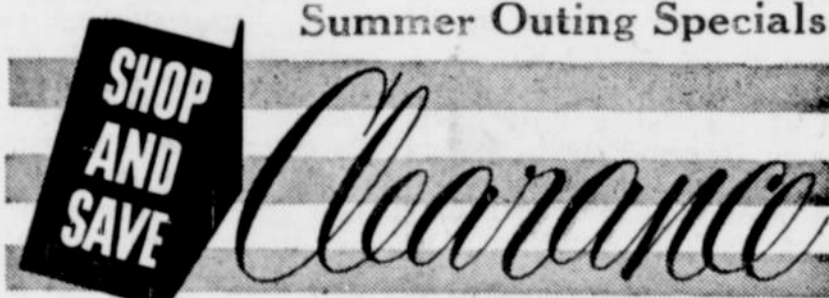
