October is DOUGHNUT TIME!

Doughnuts are on display at neighborhood grocery stores and bakeries. Halloween, you know! If you like to make your own—

Here is a basic DOUGHNUT RECIPE

Beat 4 egg yolks or 2 whole eggs until light. Add 1 cup sugar, 2 T. melted butter, 1/2 cup milk. Sift together: 3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour or 4 cups pastry flour, 4 t. baking powder, 1 t. salt, 1/2 t. nutmeg, 1/2 t. cinnamon. Add dry ingredients to liquid and mix together until well blended. Chill dough. Roll to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut with floured cutter. Fry in heated fat—375°. Slide doughnuts from spatula into hot fat. Fry on each side until golden brown. Remove, drain on absorbent paper.

SPECIAL TRICKS FOR DOUGHNUT TREATS:

Drench warm doughnuts in granulated or powdered sugar, add cinnamon or chopped nuts, too, if you like. Try adding 3 tablespoons grated orange rind and substitute orange juice for the liquid. While warm, dip these in powdered sugar. Add maple flavoring and chopped nuts, serve warm with scoop of vanilla or maple- nut ice cream. Lazy? Drop spoonfuls into hot fat and have drop doughnuts.
