Duffie Survives Crash In Spain

Col. Claire A. P. Duffie, 38, York, Pa., was one of three survivors of an Air Force Transport plane crash last weekend in the mountains north of Madrid Spain.

Colonel Duffie is the son of Mrs. Ray Bosworth, Route 2, Central Point. Mrs. Bosworth was notified by telegram of the accident earlier this week.

Colonel Duffie and two other survivors of the six man crew were rescued by Air Force helicopter Sunday and taken to the American military hospital in Madrid. Duffie received facial lacerations and fractured ribs clavicle, but is in good condition, according to reports.

The C-47 crashed while on a flight from France to Getafe, Spain.

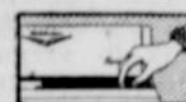
