Comets Win 6 A-2 Baseball Title From Douglas 4-3

An overthrow at first base in the bottom of the 11th inning sent in a Comet run and gave the Crater High school baseball squad the District 6 A-2 title over Douglas 4 to 3 Saturday afternoon on the city field.

The victory allows the Comets to meet Junction City in the quarter-final playoff. A win over Junction City would throw the Comets into the Semi-final play-off with District 7 and 8 winner for the right to enter the state A-2 title game in Portland.

Crater and Douglas each earned three runs in the fourth inning. The score remained knotted until the overthrow in the 11th inning.

Fred Herrmann, Comet hurler, whiffed 10 batters, hit two for a free walk and gave up eight hits. Bob Gilman, throwing for Douglas, also fanned 10, gave three passes and allowed seven hits.

Crater was marked for five errors with the Trojans slipping once.

masonry sub-contractor. Architect Robert Keenev reported that the Gold Hill school job is progressing nicely.

A bid of \$6,341 from Hauptert Tractor Co. for a G.M.C. chassis and a 65-passenger Carpenter school bus body was accepted by board members. The new unit, to be delivered in Central Point before the fall term, has a 260-inch wheelbase and 160 horsepower engine.

Bids, which were opened Monday evening, May 14, were received from Parsons Motors and McCormick Equipment.

Board members decided to allow the new Central Point Junior Chamber of Commerce to paint the inside and outside of the junior high school athletic field fence as a combination civic and fund raising project.

Bill Esselstyn, representing the Jaycees, presented bids of \$630 for inside and outside painting and \$428 for inside only.

Supt. H. P. Jewett was authorized to enter into a contract with the U. S. Appraisal Co. for a complete and detailed appraisal of district buildings and equipment. This firm has a Medford office. The appraisal will be used to determine whether district insurance should be carried on a depreciated or full replacement basis.

An additional janitor was hired at Gold Hill for next year and a janitor was hired for Central Point.
