

Summer Maintenance Work At Schools in Full Swing

Summer maintenance and repair work on school buildings and grounds of School District 6C is now in full swing according to a report from Supt. H. P. Jewett this week.

The usual cleaning, painting, minor repair and renovation of buildings has been started by the custodial staff. There are many major projects which are being done by contract. Specifications and directions covering these projects are prepared in the superintendent's office, competitive prices are secured and work is awarded to the lowest bidder. Floyd Shore, head of maintenance for the district is assisting Supt. Jewett in supervising and directing much of the work.

Major projects already partly completed are a roof repair job at Crater High and a basement floor and drainage job at the Sams Valley school. Both of these jobs are being done by the firm of Purdy and Petrehan. Projects soon to be started are the remodeling and modernizing of the two classrooms adjacent to the small gymnasium at the Central Point Elementary school; additional plumbing in the boys lavatory of the brick building, exterior painting of the small gymnasium and adjacent classrooms; floor tiling in the office area of the Junior High; and re-roofing of the bus garage and two of the small classroom buildings.

Floor tiling of rooms at the Gold Hill school and the Sams Valley school will be done as soon as suitable bids are received.

At the Gold Hill school a basement room is being prepared for homemaking classes and the dishwashing area is being remodeled for more efficient and more sanitary handling of the dishes. Cabinet work for these projects is being done by the custodian and plumbing work will be done by bid. Additional plumbing will be installed in the health room also.

Other work on the list for Gold Hill is roof repair of the bus garage, installation of additional basketball backboards in the tennis court and the re-surfacing of the court area with asphalt mix. A concrete gutter and retaining wall are planned to control water from winter rains which has been eroding and cutting up the playground.

At Crater High an additional classroom will be prepared as a temporary installation in the north balcony of the gymnasium. This will be sound-proofed against gymnasium class noise and will be used until further classrooms can be added. Most of this work will be done with custodial help. Completion of the baseball diamond on the east grounds at Crater High and further leveling and curbing of the track are on the list. Ad-

ditional bleachers will be built for use on the football field.

Black topping at both the Central Point Elementary and the Crater High grounds will be done some time in July.

Every effort is being made to complete most of the custodial work by August 10, according to Jewett. From that time on considerable work will be needed on the new buildings. Moving of present furniture and equipment to the 16 rooms in the new buildings as well as new equipment and furniture will be a big job. Window washing at all the buildings is one of the last jobs done and in some areas takes about ten days.

Installation of the flag poles, road construction, sidewalks, and landscaping are not included in the construction contract and will have to be done in August.

Other work not included in the construction contract is the under window shelving and cabinets. There are thirty-two of these cabinets and they are being built in the Crater High shop by Charles Moore, shop teacher at Crater.
