Pear Harvest Seen August 9

Pear harvest in the Rogue valley has been tentatively scheduled to commence August 9, according to a report from the Rogue River Valley Traffic association.

The estimate for the packers and shippers was made by John Higdon, of the Medford experiment station, and Cliff Cordy, county agent for horticulture, and was calculated on a formula using temperature factors of the fruit taken six weeks from full bloom. This formula has been used successfully in some areas of California.

The August 9 starting date will vary slightly in some parts of the valley but will hold true for the majority of orchards, it was stated.

Approximately 4,500 pickers will be needed to harvest his years pear crop which is expected to reach three million boxes of fruit.
