In many cases, local news is local news in either community - of equal interest to both. In some cases, because of page makeups it will be impossible to separate the news. We believe, however, that in establishing The Times, Gold Hill, we will be fulfill - in need of corresponding as great a need as has been found to be true with The Times in Rogue River.

For the last 3 weeks Gold Hill people and all who receive their mail out of Gold Hill, have been receiving The Times, Rogue River.

This was to establish the field, to feel the pulse of the readers, as it were. We believe the people of Gold Hill will like their Times and we open its pages to them all for the news of the locality they may wish to submit.
