

JOSEPH W. MC CLOY LAID TO REST

Funeral services were held Monday in the Gold Hill Methodist church for Joseph Wallace McCloy, 63, of Highway 99, Mullers Gulch, who died of a heart attack Wednesday, Jan. 16.

Rev. H.A. Dierdorff of the Gold Hill Methodist church officiated at the last rites.

Burial was in Hillcrest Memorial Park in Grants Pass.

Mrs. McCloy found her husband's body in their car when she returned from Grants Pass on Wednesday night.

He had apparently driven the car to the highway to meet her just before death came to him.

He was born Sept. 26, 1888, at Greeley, Colo., and for many years was employed by the American Express Company in Denver.

Later he was a tile setter and then for years operated a service station in Los Angeles.

Seven years ago he purchased the ranch and a little over six years ago he and Mrs. McCloy moved here. He had been in ill health for some time.

Surviving are his widow, Nellie V. McCloy, two sons, Sproul T. of Los Angeles, and Robert W. of San Anselmo; two brothers, J.A. of Greeley, Colo., and Charles of Fresno, Calif.; three sisters, Edyth Reid and Mabel McBurney of Denver; and Lillah Brown of Daly City.

Robert, Sproul, Charles and Lillah, and Mrs. Brown's daughter, Lillah all arrived in time for the funeral.
