The Jackson County Chap ter has applied to the New York office of the Foundation for a gran of \$2, 726, 93. This request was made necessary because of the tremendous cost of the care of county patients during the past year, which exhausted the chapter funds and left a deficit in this amount.

The grant will be made through the Epidemic Aid Fund of the National Foundation, which is reserved for such purposes. It will enable the local chapter to pay all accumulated bills up to December 31st, thus making possible the start of the new year with a clean slate.

"While we continue to fight this battle with all the mat erial and human resources at our command, " Chipman said, "it is reassuring to know that the National Foundation stands solid. ly behind us. Nothing could better demonstrate the teamwork and the solid partnership which exists between National Headquarters and the Chapters of the NationalFoundation. When polio strikes in force, no community, large or small, contains sufficient resources to stand alone in this fight. '

The chairman declared that this is one of the basic reasons why March of Dimes funds raised in each county are shared on a 50-50 basis with Headquarters of the National Foundation. And he urged that everyone drop an extra dime in whenever they passed one of those "polio" cans placed in many locations around the county.

Death came suddenly Jan. 22 to Allan Baldridge, 60, who for the last 9 years had been a resident of Rogue River.


Mr. Baldridge was in the veterans hospital in Portland when the end came without warning. Exact cause of his death was not known at press time.
