Her husband is suspected to be the perpetrator of the outrage, as a suit for divorce is pending in the district court here.

Stamp Stealers.

William Gordon, a mail clerk in the employ of M. B. Cladin & Co., has been arrested charged with swindling his employers of nearly \$2,000. He confessed his guilt and said he was first tempted to steal sheets of postage stamps by Thos. L. Smith, a fellow clerk. They divided the proceeds for two years, when Gordon determined to stop stealing. Smith threatened to expose him if he did not continue the peculations.

Fire at Brooklyn.

A fire in Towler Crompton & Co's. lined mill, extending from 53 to 63 Furman street, burned all night, and the owners estimate their loss at from \$250,000 to \$300,000, and storehouse D of Watson's stores, the losses being \$100,000. The mill, which was built by Hartlett & Green, burned severely. It was filled from the ground floor to the roof with sugar, jute, hemp, cotton, and other inflammable material.

General News.

A late dispatch says, Fanny Edwards and Madame La Chapelle began the task of walking 3000 quarter miles in 300 quarter hours, at Platt's Hall in S. F. on the 24th inst.

Two little children of Mr. R. A. Cooper, of Wheatland, fell into an open fire-place a few days ago. One died a few minutes after the accident and the other it is thought, is fatally injured.

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NOTICE TO DONATION CLAIMANTS.

THE ATTENTION OF CLAIMANTS to donations of land, their assignees and legal representatives, is particularly called to that part of section 3 of the act of congress, approved July 17 1834, entitled "An act to amend an act approved September twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and fifty, to create the office of Surveyor General of the public lands in Oregon, etc., and also the act amendatory thereof, approved February nineteenth, (fourteenth) eighteen hundred and fifty-three; which reads as follows: "All persons claiming lands, under this act or the acts of which it is amendatory shall ... give notice to the Surveyor General or other duly authorized officer, of the particular lands claimed as such donation, within thirty days after being requested so to do by such officer; and failing ... the claimant or claimants shall forfeit all right and claim thereto."

Now therefore the undersigned being such officer duly authorized officer he hereby give notice to each and every person, his or her assignee and legal representatives, claimants of donations of land within the district of lands subject to sale at the United States District Land Office at Roseburg, Oregon, under said acts of congress, that each and every one of them within thirty days from the 19th day of July 1879, (being the day of the expiration of six week's publication heretofore give notice to the register and receiver of said Land Office at Roseburg, Oregon, of the particular lands claimed on such donations, and failing such notice, ... the claimant or claimants shall forfeit all right and claim thereto."

And each and every person claiming the benefit of said act of September 27, 1853, and the legislation supplemental thereto, will within six months after the expiration of the aforesaid six week's publication, caused to be filed in the U. S. District Land Office at Roseburg, Oregon, complete their claims to a donation of land under said acts, and failing so to do, such claims will be held for cancellation.
