General Grant Arrives in San Francisco.

The steamer "City of Tokio," with Gen. Grant and party on board, arrived in San Francisco on the 21st. As soon as the steamer was sighted, a reception committee consisting of Frank M. Pixley, ex-Senator Cole, General Miller and P. B. Cornwall, repaired to the tug "Miller Griffith," lying with steam up at the Pacific Mail Dock, to escort the wharves, and in fact the entire city in the vicinity of the landing, was a mass of human beings, eager to get a sight of, and greet their distinguished fellow citizen. The city was magnificently decorated, and the cheers of the populace and the thunder of cannon vied with each other in their demonstrations of spontaneous welcome. The General was met at the landing by the Mayor, Governor, and Executive Committee, and formal congratulations were passed and responded to. The procession passed with difficulty through the crowded streets to the Palace Hotel, where a triumphal arch had been formed, on which was inscribed: "Welcome to Grant." After entering the hotel, in response to repeated calls, the General came forward and said: "Fellow citizens of San Francisco:—After twenty-five years absence I am glad to meet you and assure you of my cordial thanks for the kind welcome you have given me. I shall stay in your city long enough to greet you more fully."

The general will spend some time on the Coast, and probably visit Oregon.

The Darien Ship Canal.

Capt. Eades is very enthusiastic over his plan for building a railroad to carry ships across the Isthmus. He says: I have demonstrated the feasibility of my plan, and I have the assurance of a number of capitalists that they are ready to furnish me with the necessary money to construct a ship-railway across the Isthmus of Darien whenever I am prepared to build it. Shipbuilders, men who are in the habit of taking vessels out upon dry-docks, are the most enthusiastic men I have met in favor of ship-railway. They say it is a thing that can be done, and that a ship can be safely supported on a cradle for transit without the least danger whatever. I am making all arrangements as rapidly as possible, and confidently hope to be able to transport the largest merchant-vessels fully loaded, from the Caribbean Sea to the Pacific Ocean within the next four years.

Indian Difficulties in New Mexico.

Late Washington dispatches say the Indians are committing many outrages in Grant county, New Mexico. The regular troops stationed in that country are insufficient to protect the settlers. Lew Wallace, Territorial Governor, has asked for Federal permission to raise three or four companies of volunteers for field service, but the secretary of war has denied the request for want of authority, and has announced that he will concentrate the force required, at once.

Interesting Relics.

It will be remembered by our readers that some time since a quantity of bees-wax was plowed up on Clatsop plains, supposed to have formed a part of the cargo of some vessel or vessels wrecked so long ago that the event is not recorded. It is now announced that Mr. C. A. McGuire has plowed up some coin, supposed to have been lost at the same time as the bees-wax. It is said that such coin has been found before, and they are supposed to have belonged to the Jesuits of an early period.

The official count of the votes cast at the late Maine election, shows that the Republicans lack something over 500 votes of having a majority over both Democrats and Greenbackers, and the election is therefore thrown into the legislature. As the Republicans have a large majority in the legislature the State will have a Republican administration.

A tie bound across the track wrecked an incoming train on the C. B. & Q. road near Coquille. It is now announced that Mr. C. A. McGuire has plowed up some coin, supposed to have been lost at the same time as the bees-wax. It is said that such coin has been found before, and they are supposed to have belonged to the Jesuits of an early period.

The South Africa cable has been completed between Natal and Mozambique. The section from Mozambique to Zanzibar will be finished before the 20th instant, which will place South Africa within nine days' communication with England.

A special to the Pioneer Press from Winnepesaukee says that advices from Wood Mountain report a fight between Indians, who closed the line after buffalo, and U. S. soldiers. Nine Indians were killed and three soldiers. Two chiefs were wounded.

A London dispatch of the 17th says: A new iron turret gun, the Agamemnon, carrying four 35-ton guns, and 492 tons burthen, with six engines of 6,000 horse power, was successfully launched to-day.

Acting Commissioner Armstrong, of the general land office, has informed the U. S. surveyor general at Portland, Oregon, that no mines lying below high-water mark on the ocean beach can be disposed of under U. S. law.

A North Carolina paper states that two Moravian preachers in Cherokee county, made so many converts that rebel-minded residents became alarmed. The preachers were soundly whipped and the converts were tickled with hickory twigs.

Clearly in Error.

The Argus has, in several items, recently expressed the idea that the small tides in the bay, which have attracted the attention of the editor of that paper, were caused by the accumulation of sand at the entrance. This is a mistake, and one that might lead to an erroneous conclusion as to the difficulties to be encountered in the improvement of our harbor. The truth is, that there has never been a time when the accumulation of sand at the bar has been sufficient to have any effect on the height of the tide in the bay. The phenomenon of the irregularity of the tides, in size, as well as in time, is one that may be noticed at the cape, or at any point on the ocean beach as well as within the bay. Any person who has given attention to this subject will bear us out in the statement that this small difference between high and low water is often noticed in the bay when there has been no weather which could have caused an unusual movement of sands at the bar. One might be led to suppose, from the comments of the Argus, that we are liable to wake up some morning and find the tide shut out of the bay by a huge sand bar! It is to be regretted that such representations are made. The only effect of the shifting sands is to slightly shoal the channel at times, and to cause it gradually to change its course, but a few tides, with ordinary weather, always restore a good, navigable channel. In fact, for two years past, the channel has been almost uniformly good.

Distinguished Visitors.

On Thursday morning it was announced by telegraph that Senator Slater and A. Noltner, editor of the Portland "Standard" were coming by stage over the Coos Bay road and would arrive that evening. Accordingly the steamer Juno was engaged to go to Coos City, carrying a large number of our citizens to meet the distinguished visitors. The stage arrived at Coos City about 8 o'clock, and the party came down the slough to this place and passed the night. Yesterday morning, the Senator and Mr. Noltner, having been tendered the use of the tug "Escort" by Mr. Merchant, went down the bay and had a view of the bar and the surroundings of the proposed harbor improvement. In the afternoon the party returned on the "Juno" and proceeded to Newport, and thence by way of the Isthmus to the Coquille. From the Coquille country they will probably return to Roseburg.

We are pleased that our new Senator has shown himself willing, at the sacrifice of conscience, to visit this place and to satisfy himself, by personal examination, of the resources and wants of this part of the State. All that is required to secure the needed future appropriations to carry forward the plans already adopted by Congress for the encouragement of our commerce, and as Senator Slater has shown the right spirit, we shall expect much from his services.

Extraordinary Discovery in Silver.

A Texas paper publishes a private letter from a citizen of Austin, now in Saltillo, Mexico, which states that new silver mines have been discovered 200 miles from Saltillo, Mexico. The lode is said to be fifty miles long and thirty feet wide, and of unknown depth. The ore yields one half pure silver; about one half the ground in sight is pure silver. People are going from Saltillo day and night. There is no law in the new mining district, and any one who goes must take his life in his hand. The mines are situated in the desert called Sierra Mojada, which means wet mountain, but there is no water within fifty miles of the place. A party of gentlemen leave Austin to-morrow for Mexico, and will visit this most extraordinary find.

It is a grand sight to see the enormous amount of wheat continually being unloaded at the depot. Never before in our history has there been so much brought to town as this year. Last week it came in so fast that the railroad company could not carry it all away by 300 tons, says the Walla Walla "Statesman." They ship 441 tons to Wallula every day. They are doing all in their power to get rid of it, and we have but little doubt that they will be able to send it away in good time.

Geo. F. Cole, a young man, son of postmaster Geo. E. Cole of Portland died last Saturday night, from an over dose of morphine.

The New Northwest has entered upon its ninth volume. It is an able and fearless advocate of a good cause, and deserves to prosper.

It is stated that M. De Lensepe has abandoned the Darien ship canal project, owing to the want of encouragement from men of capital. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 17.—Frank H. Loring, aged fifty years, suicided this morning. He poured coal oil over his clothes and set himself on fire. Smoke from the window attracted the attention of people on the street, who ran to the room in the second story, broke it open, and found the man burned to a crisp.

English gold is now coming to the United States in large sums. 75 cents per wagon load, is the price of watermelons in Kansas. As advance in the price of breadstuffs in England is anticipated. LIEUT. GEO. LONO, of Massachusetts has been nominated for governor of that State by the Republicans. THE granger's wool of Douglas county, brought 27 1/2 cents, which is more than was realized by any of the farmers who sold to local purchasers. W. H. ODELL, of the Statesman, will be absent from Salem for a while, engaged in a surveying contract. His place as editor of the Statesman, will be filled by D. W. Craig, an experienced journalist.
