SENATOR BAYARD'S FINANCIAL POLICY.

Senator Bayard, who, prior to the assembling of Congress, was mentioned as a prominent candidate for the Presidency, is forcing upon Congress his resolution for the repeal of the legal tender character of the greenbacks, and a late dispatch announces that it "will be reported back to the Senate adversely, instead of remaining locked up in the Committee by a tie vote, because he personally requested the Committee not to wait for the return of Senator Jones, but to report it as once, although adversely, in order that he and those who sympathize with his views may test the views of the Senate on the important question as soon as possible. This urgency, as will be readily inferred, is based upon a belief that majority of the Senate will sustain his views upon the subject; but a very few of his friends are equally sanguine. The best judgment at present is, that the proposition cannot as it stands obtain anything like a majority of votes, and opinions are divided as to its prospects in the event of its being so amended as to make the date for the repeal remotely prospective, say five years hence. Senator Bayard is much mistaken if he thinks that either he or his party will gain any strength by the advocacy of this measure. The country has "just recovered from a depression in business, caused, as is popularly believed, by bad management of the national finances. Silver, gold, and greenbacks pass at par in all parts of the country, and business is rapidly assuming a satisfactory basis. The trade of the brokers, which was regular and very profitable for many years, caused by the depreciated and fluctuating value of currency, is gone, and their is no want of popular faith in either of the several kinds of money which constitute our "circulating medium." The people are satisfied with this condition of things, and see no excuse for this kind of legislation. But Bayard and his theory have their friends, and will carry at last a large minority of the Democratic votes in Congress, and what is worse for the party, will raise in their own ranks an irreconcilable division on this very important financial question. It cannot but be considered as a misfortune to that party, that a faction of any considerable influence is in favor of this measure, and it would be a misfortune to the country to have a party whose leaders advocate such a policy come into power. The result of a Democratic success would be to destroy public faith in the continuance of our present condition of the finances, and throw the country back into the unfortunate condition from which it has just emerged.

A Revolting Crime.

And again a victim has fallen before the worst of all criminals, the assassin. The horrible details of deeds here at home are fresh in our memories, and now comes another to the Salem Statesman under the date of Canyon City, Monday, January 12th, and is as follows: "A drunken debauch ended on Saturday night in the most foul and revolting murder of an old German miner by the name of Henry Stevens, by a man named John Darby. The particulars of the crime are too disgusting to bear reduction to writing. The populace were and are very much excited, and there is much talk of lynch law. Darby is in jail. So much excited were the people that he waived an examination before the magistrate, and stands committed without bail. I think if he had made his appearance in the court room the crowd would have summarily administered justice, and thus saved a considerable bill to the county. Stevens was an inoffensive, poor old miner, much addicted to strong drink, and when on his spree, his cabin was the resort of dead beats and the lowest order of sets, and in a drunken orgie he was inhumanly dealt with and beat to death."

Tilden and McClellan.

A late Washington dispatch says "an intimate friend of Gov. Tilden expressed the firm belief that Tilden does not desire the next Presidential nomination for himself, but that he would like to be in a position where he can decline the nomination gracefully in favor of some candidate known to be acceptable to him. Who Mr. Tilden would prefer is not developed, but indications point to Gen. McClellan." It is not very probable that Gov. Tilden has given up his hope of reaching the White House, nor that he would decline in favor of any of his friends; but nothing would make the success of the Republicans more certain than the nomination of McClellan by the Democracy. His record during the war, and especially his platform of 1864 would be an insurmountable barrier in his progress as a candidate for the Presidency.

On the Verge of Starvation.

Distress in Ireland is increasing. Five hundred inhabitants in the Keshbeg district, county Limerick, are on the brink of starvation. They proceeded to-day in a body to Croon and obtained four cartloads of bread by urgent representation of their necessity. The streets of Cork are patrolled by mounted police, and the magistrates of the city have passed resolutions urging greater activity in the suppression of demonstrations partaking of the nature of bread riots, and asking for the appointment of additional police. Sixty alcoholized men with their families, were yesterday admitted to the Killarney workhouse. A woman applied for admission on Tuesday, with her children, one of whom was dead in her arms from hunger and exposure, the woman having walked a distance of forty miles. The mayors of Sheffield and Brighton and other towns have opened relief subscription, but the universal opinion is that private relief cannot cope with the distress.

An Extract from Ingersol's Speech.

We take the following from Robt. Ingersol's speech in Chicago, on the occasion of the late reunion of the Army of the Tennessee. The toast was to the "Volunteer soldiers of the Union Army":

"Blood was water, money was leaves, and life was only common air, until one flag floated over the Republic without a master and without a slave. Then was asked the question, 'Will a free people tax themselves to pay the Nation's debt?' The soldiers went home to their waiting wives, to their glad children, and to the girls they loved. They went back to the fields, the shops, and the mines. They had not been demoralized. They had been ennobled. They were as honest in peace as they were in war. Mocking at poverty, laughing at reverses they made a friend of toil. They said: 'We saved the Nation's life, and what is life without honor?' They worked and wrought with all of labor's royal sows that every pledge the Nation gave might be redeemed. And their great leader, having put a shining band of friendship, a girdle of clasped and happy hands around the globe, comes home and finds every promise made in war has the ring, and gleam of gold. There is another question still. Will the wounds war be healed? I answer, yes. The Southern people must submit not to the dictation of the North but the Nation's will, and to the verdict of mankind. They were wrong, and the time will come when they will say that they are the victors who have been vanquished by the right. Freedom conquered them, and Freedom will cultivate their fields, educate their children weave for them the robes of wealth, execute their laws and fill their land with happy homes. The soldiers of the Union saved the South as well as the North. Their victories made us free and rendered tyranny in every other land as insecure as snow upon the volcano's lips. And now let us drink to the volunteers, to those who sleep in unknown, sunken graves, whose names are only in the hearts of those they loved and left, of those who often hear in happy dreams the footsteps of return. Let us drink to those who died while lipless famine mocked. To all the maimed, whose scars give modesty a tongue, and all who dared and gave to chance the care, the keeping of lives; to all the dead; to Sherman, to Sheridan, and to Grant, the foremost soldier of the world; and last, to Lincoln, whose loving life, like the bow of peace, spans and arches all the clouds of war."

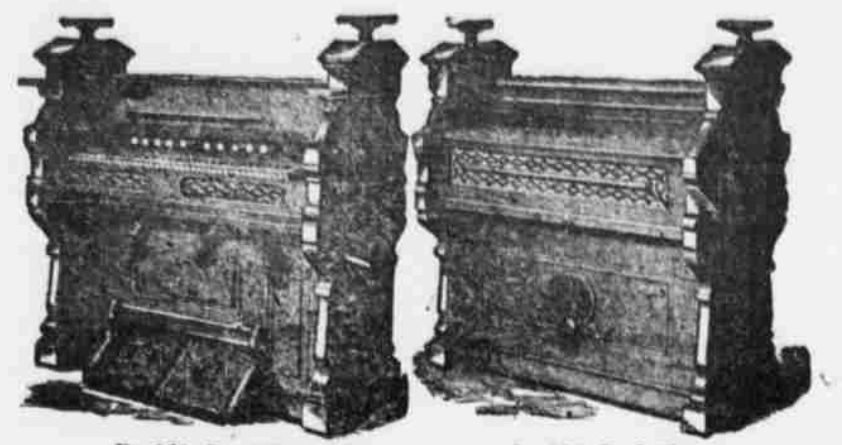
