About Distinguished Men.

A. H. Stephens and Senator Hill have, it is reported, adjusted their ancient quarrel. The Augusta Chronicle says that a mutual friend from time to time conveyed between the two some laudatory expressions of each about the other, and finally informed Mr. Hill of Mr. Stephens' eulogies upon his recent speeches in the Senate.

Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes says that the first time that he ever visited Theodore Parker, the scholarly reputation of the young preacher then not quite thirty years old, had not reached him. "In looking round the library," says Dr. Holmes, "I saw upon his great series of quartos—'Brucker's Historia Critica Philosophiae.' 'You have hardly read that, I said, not thinking that any student, in these degenerated days, grappled with these megalithic monsters of primitive erudition. 'Oh, yes, I have,' he answered very quietly; and then I, who thought I was dealing with a modest young divine of the regulation patron, took another look at the massive head of the young man, whom Mr. Wendell Phillips has lately spoken of as the 'Jupiter of the pulpit.'"

Senator Hamblin Hamlin has a pleasant cream-colored, prettily-furnished house at Baragar. He has four children living, his youngest son having graduated at Bowdoin last commencement. The Senator is the oldest living man in the public service. "But I am tired of it," he says: "It harasses me more than it used to. If you are in political life you are everybody's slave, and don't even own yourself. I shall quit as soon as I can. I would rather live here than in Washington. I have a comfortable home, and a farm near here of about twenty acres, that yields me as much as the average farm through the country. But I am still strong. Very often I go fishing or hunting with the boys, and I often hear them whisper, 'We'll give the old man a soft place, but they generally come home behind the old man.'"

The sweetest little fish story of the season is told by Frank Abbott, of Burlington, Iowa. At Clear Lake dwells a little girl who takes a ride in a small skiff drawn by two pickers. They are regularly harnessed, and by means of lines she is enabled to guide them in any direction. The fish are about three feet in length, weigh between seven and eight pounds each, and are very powerful. When the girl is tired of riding she drives the picker to a boat house where they are unharnessed, taken into a commodious glass aquarium made expressly for them, and fed. When she goes to the tank to harness them for a ride, the pickerer jump almost into her arms, so glad apparently, are they to see her. The young miss has been offered \$1,000 for her team.

Some Canary birds are very easily trained; others remain shy and intractable to the last. An amateur slight-of-hand performer gives this as his method for rendering a canary tame enough for trick-playing: "Take a young bird and put oil of bergamot on his bill. 'It will make him drunk as a lord;' then roll him in your hands until he is familiar with your touch, and put him in his cage to come to himself. He can be handled afterwards at any time without being at all frightened."

JOHN HARRINGTON and a man in his employ, of Grass Valley, Wasco county, while going from Dalles to their home with a two horse team, became lost in the hills east of the Deschutes river two weeks ago. Mr. Harrington found his way to a house after being out three days. He was badly frozen. A party of men started out and after two days' search found the hired man lying under the wagon five miles from the house, wrapped up in a blanket and almost dead, having been out five days without anything to eat.

France has agricultural school for girls. One of the chief is near Rouen, which is said to have been begun with a capital of one franc by a Sister of Charity and two little discharged prisoners and to be now worth \$160,000. This establishment has 300 girls, from 6 to 18. The farm entirely cultivated by them, is over 400 acres in extent. Twenty-five sisters form the staff of teachers. More than one medal of the French Agricultural Society has been awarded to this establishment at Darnetel and the pupils are in great demand all over Normandy on account of their skill. They go out as stewards, gardeners, farm managers, dairy women and laundresses. Each girl has on leaving an outfit and a small amount of money, earned in spare hours. If they want a home they can always return to Darnetel, which are taught to regard as home.
