The Question of State Rights—The Democratic Address.

A committee of Democrats consisting of General Lane, W. H. Effinger, E. C. Bradshaw, M. V. Brown and A. Noltner have met and prepared an address to the Democrats of Oregon, which is being circulated by the Democratic press as a sort of opening campaign document. It recognizes the fact of the existence of dissensions in their party, but enjoins upon the faithful to forget personal feuds and join the common fight.

There appears to be a prospect that work on this great undertaking will be soon commenced. A dispatch from a correspondent of the World says: "I came over from Aspinwall to Panama in the same car with M. De Lesseps. He was met at Metachin by a delegation of citizens, and all along the road he was received at the stations with the greatest enthusiasm. The Government of the State of Panama has proclaimed a three day's holiday on the occasion, and this ancient city is all out of doors to-day and in a state of wild excitement. There will be a bull fight and a grand parade of the troops, with a banquet. M. De Lesseps says that he has made arrangements for a complete verification of the surveys, which will require about six months, at the end of which time the work of constructing the canal will begin. The verification of the survey has been undertaken by M. Dicks, and the work was inaugurated this afternoon at the mouth of the Rio Grand, near Panama, by M. Dicks and M. De Lesseps, who adheres to his plan as adopted at Paris of a sea-level canal. He said to me to-day: It is the only practicable plan, and I will carry it through. M. De Lesseps declared here that he is quite sure of the money necessary to complete the work."

The sentiment contained in this resolution in as sound Republican doctrine to-day as it was in 1860. The Democratic party, being without any distinctive principles to recommend it to the people, and desiring to divert attention from their unfortunate and unpopular record for the past twenty years, are persistently charging upon the Republicans a disposition to create a centralized government and ignore the rights of the States. The Republican party maintain no such doctrine. The issue between the Republican and Democratic parties on the subject of State rights arose long ago, and assumed a practical form in 1860-61 when the Democrats boldly maintained the right of a State to judge when its rights were infringed and to resist the United States authority even to the extent of annihilating the United States government by secession.

The ultra "pestilential heresy" was met and resisted by the Republicans in the halls of legislation and in the field of battle—and it was crushed. The Republican party fought for the principles it now maintains, and they have not advanced one step in aggression against the rights of the separate States since 1860. If there is now one issue between the two parties on the subject of State rights, it is the same issue that brought the same parties face to face in mortal combat in 1861. If the Democratic party maintain the right of a State to "nullify" the laws of the United States or to disclaim and renounce their relation to the general government, when its citizens think they have a grievance, they will always find the Republicans directly and firmly resisting that doctrine. But the Republicans do not favor a policy on the part of the United States government, looking to the destruction of any of the

reserved rights of the States. The political doctrines of J. C. Calhoun and Jeff. Davis on the subject of State rights belong to the Democratic party; the views of Lincoln to the Republicans; let the issue go to the people.

War Preparations.

A late cable dispatch says that the action of the French and Russian Governments in increasing their armies, has determined the German Government to follow suit, greatly to the disgust and dissatisfaction of the country generally, and in particular of the classes from whom the additional troops are to be drawn. The strength of the Imperial army on a peace footing is in round numbers, 420,000 men, with 97,000 horses and 12,000 guns. On a war footing it is about 1,800,000 men, with 282,000 horses and 2700 guns, not including the second class of Landstrum. It is understood that the first reserves will be summoned at the outlet for the purpose of filling up gaps in regiments and battalions now in arms. There is much activity in army circles, and a feeling prevails that the peace of Europe cannot much longer be maintained. In case of an outbreak of hostilities Germany will be able to mobilize her entire army, if necessary, with rapidity and precision. It is asserted that the proposed increase of the army is merely precautionary, and not due to any special programme of action, but solely to the aggressive attitude of the other continental powers. It is, however, an ominous fact that, the works of Herr Krupp are running night and day, without cessation, to fill orders that have been received from the German War Office.

A Darien Canal.

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Prepare for the Census.

The machinery for taking the census is being organized, and every farmer will in the next few months be called upon to furnish a statement of his agricultural productions for the year ending June 1st, 1880. The statement must include the number of acres, bushels of wheat, corn, rye, oats, barley, buckwheat and potatoes; bushels of peas, beans, clover seed, grass seed and flax seed; acres and pounds of rice, tobacco, hops and flax; acres and bales of cotton; acres and value of products of orchards vineyards and small fruit; acres and tons of hay and hemp; bees, number of hives, pounds of wax, pounds of honey; sugar cane, acres, hogsheads of sugar, gallons of molasses; sorghum, acres, pounds of sugar, gallons of molasses. Crop of the calendar year 1880—Wool, number of fleeces and pounds; maple sugar, pounds; maple molasses, gallons. Yield of the twelve months, June 1, 1879, to May 31, 1880—Butter and cheese, number of pounds; gallons of milk sold; money value of animals slaughtered; acres and value of garden products marketed; value of forest product; value of home manufactures.

A serious quarrel is reported at Kallioch, Poland, between Russian and German officers. While at dinner and in course of political argument the Russians used insulting language to Germany. Bloodshed was averted by a Russian Colonel sending home the German officers under escort. The German Ambassador at St. Petersburg has been instructed to ask an explanation from Russia. The quarrel is regarded at Berlin as a striking revelation of the present tone of Russian military circles.

A mine explosion occurred at Newcastle upon the Tyne at 8 o'clock on the 21st. From 70 to 90 persons are in the pit, and it is not thought possible that one can escape. Search is delayed by damage to the shaft. The explosion is owing to the gasconcentration of the coal seam.

A Mr. Davis, from Iowa, says the "Mountaineer" is engaged in buying cattle to drive East. We learn that he has purchased over 4,000 head in the Rock Creek country, in this county, and on the Ray Fork of Willow Creek in Unadilla county. The prices paid are as follows: For yearlings, \$7; for cows and two year-olds, \$10; for three year-olds, \$15, and for four year-olds and upwards, \$18.

The Parliament of New Zealand is ahead of all others on the Equal Rights question. It has conferred the elective franchise upon all women owning real estate; and also passed a law enabling married women to acquire separate property, enter into trading partnerships and conduct business apart from their husbands.
