REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

A Republican Convention for the State of Oregon is called to meet at Portland, Wednesday, April 21st, 1880, at 11 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress, three candidates for Presidential Electors, three candidates for Judges of the Supreme Court, Judges and Prosecuting Attorneys for each of the several Judicial Districts, and the election of six delegates to attend the National Republican Convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the Convention.

The Convention will consist of 165 Delegates, apportioned among the various counties as follows:

The same being one Delegate for every 100 votes, and one for every fraction of 50 votes and over for Secretary of State at the last general election.

The Committee recommend that the primaries be held on Saturday, April 3, 1880, and the County Conventions on Saturday, April 10, 1880, unless otherwise ordered by the proper County Central Committee.

The Presidential Prospects.

A late Washington dispatch summarizes the prospects of the several Republican candidates for the Presidency, as follows:

Some of Sec Sherman's friends held an informal meeting here to talk over the situation. Most of the Republican members from Ohio were present. The meeting was without specific result, being held merely for interchange of opinion.

The Grant men in Washington are cheered by the news from New York, although the Grant sentiment is not quite as unanimous as they could wish. They claim, however, that it means Grant's nomination at Chicago, and that nothing can prevent it. They affirm that Illinois will follow the example of New York and Pennsylvania, which will give him 160 votes, with some 35 States to hear from. They argue that the Grant boom will be about at par henceforward, and that all kicking upon the trace by anti-third term Republicans will be useless. On the other hand, at the Blaine headquarters there are signs of discouragement, and his friends ask suspension of judgment until New England and the great northwest is heard from.

At the Sherman headquarters, his friends are busy and cheerful as usual, making little noise but doing a good deal of quiet work. Sherman men here do not make war upon Grant as vigorously as the Blaine men, who seem to be in a very combative mood.

Grant men profess to have definite information from Illinois that this great State will certainly wheel into line and send a solid Grant delegation. They argue that the moral effect will be immense, and bring numbers of smaller and weaker States into line. This is their view of it.

ORGANIZING FOR DEFENSE.—A San Francisco dispatch of the 26th says: The Call this morning says that a secret meeting of citizens for the purpose of organizing a vigilance committee, was held last night in the Palace Hotel. The avowed object of the organization is the suppression of any possible riot which might occur in connection with the labor agitation movements.

The Vermont Republicans have instructed in favor of Edmunds as the Presidential candidate.

Battle of Bunker Hill.

"The 17th of June, 1775, saw the four New England Colonies standing side by side, to triumph or to fall together. War, on their own soil and at their own doors, was indeed a strange work to the yeomanry of New England; but their consciences were convinced of its necessity, their country called them to it, and they did not withhold themselves from the perilous trial. The ordinary occupations of life were abandoned; the plough was staid in the unfinished furrow; wives gave up their husbands, and mothers gave up their sons, to the battles of a civil war. Death might come in honor on the field, it might come in disgrace on the scaffold. For either and for both they were prepared.

"The battle of Bunker Hill was attended with most important effects beyond its immediate result as a military engagement. It created an once a state of open, public war. There could now be no longer a question of proceeding against individuals, as guilty of treason or rebellion. That fearful crisis was past. The appeal now lay to the sword, and the only question was, whether the spirit and resources of the people would hold out till the object should be accomplished. All now saw that if America fell, she would not fall without a struggle. Men felt sympathy and regard, as well as surprise, when they beheld these infant states, remote, unknown, unaided, encounter the power of England, and in the first considerable battle, leave more of their enemies dead on the field, in proportion to the number of combatants, than they had recently known in the wars of Europe.

"Our history and our condition, all that is gone before us, and all that surrounds us, authorize the belief, that popular government may yet be as durable and permanent as any other system. We know, indeed, that in our country any other is impossible. The principle of Free Government adheres to the American soil. It is bedded in it, immovable as its mountains. There remains to us a great duty of defence and preservation; and there is open to us, also, a noble pursuit to which the spirit of the times strongly invites us. Our proper business is improvement. Let our age be the age of improvement. In a day of peace, let us advance the arts of peace and the works of peace. Let us develop the resources of our land, call forth its powers, build up its institutions, promote all its great interests, and see whether we also, in our day and generation, may not perform something worthy to be remembered. Let us cultivate a true spirit of union and harmony. In pursuing the great objects which our condition points out to us, let us act under a settled conviction, and a habitual feeling, that these States are one country. Let our conceptions be enlarged to the circle of our duties. Let us extend our ideas over the whole of the vast field in which we are called to act. Let our object be, OUR COUNTRY, OUR WHOLE COUNTRY, AND NOTHING BUT OUR COUNTRY. And, by the blessing of God, may that country itself become a vast and splendid monument, not of oppression and terror, but of wisdom, of peace, and of liberty, upon which the world may gaze with admiration for ever."

DURING the past year 121 persons committed suicide in New York City. Forty-three were drowned and 1,915 met their death by violence.

A row in a Dayton saloon between Jim Day and Charles Sanders resulted in a wound by a pistol shot in the abdomen, by which the latter cannot survive.

THE Mormon colony known as the "Davis settlement," near Walla Walla, has been invaded by diphtheria, and the two sons of Davis, known respectively as "God the Father" and "Jesus Christ" have fallen victims. The settlement will be broken up by this calamity.

THE Czarina of Russia is reported unconscious and approaching dissolution.

THE Astorian office has been lately furnished with a new cylinder press which is propelled by steam. This is an indication that the paper is meeting with the liberal support that it merits.
