Candidates for Supreme Judges.

The papers throughout the interior have for a long time past been severely criticizing various decisions of the Supreme Court of this State, as organized by Judges Prim, Kelly, and Boise.

Among the cases so criticised is the case known as the Walker-Teal case, and a case involving the title to the Canyon Road franchise, in the southern portion of Douglas county.

We have obtained from any part in these criticisms, believing that the highest judicial tribunal in the State, even though deserving of censure, should not be degraded by the public press; but it has transpired that P. Prim and J. K. Kelly have been nominated for re-election by the Democratic party, and they now ask the votes of the people of the State, to re-elect them to the offices they now hold.

It therefore becomes necessary for the voters of the State to consider whether it is advisable to re-elect these men to the Supreme bench. There is scarcely a lawyer in the State who does not admit, through want of knowledge or otherwise, the Court in these cases committed gross blunders, and subjected themselves to the ridicule and censure of not only the well-informed people of our own State, but also of the public press of California.

Judge Boise filed a dissenting opinion in the cases above referred to, and added to his reputation for integrity and legal ability by so doing.

Our Supreme Court should be above suspicion of want of integrity, or of weakness, or of ignorance. That tribunal should command the support of the people of the State, and it is apparent from the public feeling that has been aroused against these men, and the suspicion is boldly expressed that these decisions were rendered through gross ignorance of the principles of law and of legal precedents, or through favoritism, is a good reason why these men should not be re-elected. It is, and always has been admitted, that neither of these men are well qualified for this office, and the fact that they have been generally censured and suspected by the public, certainly makes it improper for them to be re-elected for the fall term.

Waldo, Watson, and Lord, whose names appear on the Republican ticket, are men of middle life, of good acquirements and ability, and entirely above suspicion. It rests with the intelligent voters of the State to say whether we shall have a distracted Supreme Court for the next six years, by electing the old Court, or whether we shall have a Court that will command respect and confidence by the election of new men. Let the people of Coos and Curry county consider this subject well, and act, not from partisan considerations, but with a view to the welfare of the State, and to create capable and honest judiciary.

A vote for either Siglin or Whiteaker is a vote to take the duty off our own shoulders and place our mines in open competition with the mines of Great Britain and her provinces. It will destroy our coal trade. In the thirteenth article of their platform they clearly commit themselves to this ruinous doctrine.

The Tariff Again.

The people are becoming aroused on the subject of the danger to our leading industry, the coal trade, from possible action of the Democratic party. To take off the duty on coal, as the Democrats propose to do, would not only prevent the opening of any new coal mines on the coast for the next fifty years, but would shut down those already opened. But Mr. Siglin says "There never was a party in the United States in favor of abolishing the tariff on either article named, and there is not now."

This is another of Siglin's shrewd (?) misrepresentations. The Democratic party, and Mr. Siglin, are in favor of abolishing the tariff altogether at the earliest possible moment. This is the 13th article in their platform, as published in the same paper: "That we are opposed to any and all protective tariffs, and are in favor of a tariff for a revenue only, and we pledge the Democratic party to abolish all restrictions upon commerce as soon as possible."

"As soon as possible" is when they propose to do the thing; that means as soon as they have the power. If the laboring men, or those interested in our home industries of any kind, understand their true interest, they will vote down the men who are committed by the platform to this doctrine. The Democrat who pretends to discard any part of this platform, is not to be trusted.

The Labor Question. Ingersol has been studying the labor question and illustrates the "irrepressible conflict" between labor and capital as follows: "Here is a shoe shop. One man in the shop is always busily at work through the day—always industrious. In the evening he goes courting a good, nice girl. There are five other men in the shop who don't do any such thing. They spend half their working hours in loafing, and their evenings in dissipation. This first young man by and by cuts out from these others and gets a shoe store of his own. Then he marries this girl. Soon he is able to take his wife out riding of an evening. The five laborers, his former companions, who see him indulging in his little luxury, retire to a neighboring saloon and pass a resolution that there is an eternal struggle between labor and capital."

COUDERSPORT, Penn., May 18.—At 3 this afternoon a fire broke out in a room of Shebbins Bros. store used for storing oil. The town is without a water supply or fire apparatus, and nothing could be done to check the fire, which burned rapidly. By 5 o'clock every dwelling, store and place of business in the town except four were laid in ashes. About forty buildings in all were destroyed; loss \$300,000; insurance, \$75,000.
